They have enjoyed working with inspiring visitors and some year groups have enjoyed visits out of school. As the term draws to a close, I would like to say a heartfelt thank you to parents/ carers for your continued support and to the staff for their unwavering dedication to the children of this school.

In the summer term, several year groups are required to participate in statutory tests. These are:

Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS)

This week, has been 'Spring', 'Eid' and 'Easter' week.

During this half – term, the children have enjoyed learning about a range of special times for different religious communities. This has included exploring the Hindu festival of Holi and learning about the Muslim time of Ramadan. This week, we learnt about the celebration of Eid ul Fitr. This is when Muslims celebrate the end of Ramadan. The children liked finding out how this special time is celebrated.

An age appropriate Easter story was shared and the children enjoyed watching a sand art retelling of the Easter story. The children have listened to this brilliantly and they had some very thoughtful questions. Throughout the week, the children had an opportunity to create spring and Easter themed crafts.

The children also enjoyed creating Easter gardens using loose parts (a range of natural objects) and using story stones/sticks puppets to retell the Easter story. The knowledge they shared at this time was fantastic and showed a great understanding of the events which Christians believe occurred at Easter time.



In literacy, the children continued to practise and showcase their brilliant writing skills while writing a spring poem. We are very impressed with the development of the children's writing ability and their letter formation.



In maths this week, the children have explored subtraction. They have learnt how to read subtraction number sentences, using key vocabulary: subtract, minus and take away. They have also practised subtraction by using practical equipment, by crossing out from a set and on interactive computer activities.

As a little teaser, next half-term the children's learning will be called 'In the garden'. We are looking forward to many different activities, linked to what we find in our gardens.





During the first week back (week beginning 21st April), we will be exploring vegetables. If you are able to provide us with a vegetable to look at, name or draw, please send these into school on Tuesday 22nd April. Thank you for your support.

Key Stage 1 (Years 1 & 2)



It has been a wonderful end to our spring term, with lots of sunshine and even more amazing learning happening in Key Stage 1. We kicked our final week off in style with a special history day, all to do with Florence Nightingale. We were lucky enough to have a visit from the famous nurse herself! She spoke to us about her life and experiences and showed us a range of artefacts from the time, which we had the chance to handle and explore. She also gave us the opportunity to write on a slate

and we even had a go at writing with ink and dip pens, just like she would have used at the time. We found meeting her was so interesting.

After meeting her, we had a portrait-painting lesson with Miss Griffiths. We learned about how to draw a realistically-proportioned face and to observe carefully as we sketch. We then painted our portraits with water colours. The results were stunning! We also made medals with Mrs Atkinson. The real Florence Nightingale received two medals from Queen Victoria in recognition of her service: The Order of Merit and The Royal Red Cross. We used card shapes and collage techniques to make replicas of these medals for ourselves.





At the end of the day, it was wonderful to see so many of our family members come into school to see what we had been doing. It was a lovely chance to showcase, not just the work we had done on Monday and throughout our entire topic, but also for our family members to meet Florence herself. Thank you to everyone for coming and helping to make the day so special.

After having such a wonderful experience on Monday, we spent our English lessons writing recounts. We described all the things we had done and how much we enjoyed them, using time connectives and conjunctions to add fact in an interesting way. From the care and detail that the children put in, it was clear that they had had a wonderful day and thoroughly enjoyed the experience.

Well done Key Stage 1, not only for this week but for the consistent hard work and great attitude you have displayed all term. Have a wonderful Easter break and we look forward to welcoming you back for our Summer Term!

Lower Key Stage 2 (Years 3 & 4)

The year 3 and 4 children have had a brilliant final week of the term!


In science this week, the children identified different types of appliances and what they are used for. To begin with, there was a lot of debate around whether or not the appliances actually used electricity. For example, a thermometer or a toothbrush could be a non-electrical item or battery powered. Afterwards, the children looked at ways of categorising the appliances and sorted them into a Venn diagram.





During this half term in RE, the children have learnt about religious celebrations. Previously, they have considered 'Why do Christians celebrate Easter?' and 'Why do Jewish people celebrate Pesach every year?'. To end their topic, the children have recalled and remembered all they have learnt over the last few weeks about these religious celebrations and completed a comparison alley to identify similarities and differences between the two celebrations.

In our last PSHE lesson, the children reflected on what they believe their strengths are, both in and out of school, and how these strengths help them to achieve. This week, we have delved into the book Tilda Tries Again by Tom Percival. The children learnt about Tilda who started to feel she wasn't as good at things as other people which impacted on how she felt about herself. When discussing how Tilda felt, the children thought about how Tilda could improve how she was feeling by talking to friends and family and by not giving up on the activities she enjoyed and always having a go.





The children have used TT Rockstars regularly in school during this half term and have been working incredibly hard to learn and quicken their recall of multiplication facts. They have thoroughly enjoyed the individual challenges and loved earning their certificates. Keep up the super work!

Upper Key Stage 2 (Years 5 & 6)

In English this week, we began to write our letter of complaint to a local restaurant of our choice. We learnt to articulate our concerns in a firm and formal tone, making it clear to the recipiant that we were beyond disappointed and deserved recompense! Much like last week, we



had to include features in our writing such as subjunctive mood and passive voice. Due to the formality of the letter, we had to consider carefully which grammatical features to include, such as semi-colons and colons, whilst avoiding less formal punctuation, such as dashes and contractions. After the Easter holiday, we will have the opportunity to write our own letters, independently.



As part of our learning in RE, we investigated Muslim charities and considered the work that they undertake around the world. We took some time exploring various charity websites and realised that the amount of aid and support they provide is quite outstanding. As a class, we then designed posters to advertise the work that they undertake.

The children in Year 5 and 6 have worked incredibly hard this term showing effort and dedication to their learning.
