Acting Headteacher's Message

Hello

Attendance and Absence

At Ralph Butterfield Primary School we believe in the importance of helping all children form excellent patterns and habits in relation to daily attendance and punctuality. We believe that by helping children from a young age develop consistent daily routines, this sets them up well for future life and gives them the best chance of accessing a full and rich educational entitlement. Both Ofsted and the Government demand that schools closely monitor daily attendance and intervene early if any patterns of absence are beginning to form.

Our Attendance and Absence Policy has been devised with the safety of your children firmly in mind. The safeguarding of your child remains our number one priority. Both as a school and you, as parents, need to know where your children are during the school day. Therefore, I would like to remind parents of the procedures for reporting and requesting absence.

What to do if my child is absent from school

Unplanned: Please contact school before 8:30am either by calling 01904 768325 and leaving a message (option 1) or by completing the online absence reporting form <u>click here</u>. Please note that 'ill' or 'poorly' does not provide sufficient detail.

Planned: Please complete a Leave of Absence request form, at least two weeks prior to the proposed start date of the leave of absence click here.

Medical/dental appointments should be made (where possible) outside of school hours. Evidence of any appointment taking place in school time can be either shown at the school office or emailed to RalphButterfield.School@york.gov.uk. Permission for the absence requires a Leave of Absence request form completing as far in advance as is practicable click here.

We would also like to take this opportunity to remind parents that there is no entitlement to additional holidays outside of normal school holiday times. The Attendance and Absence Policy also makes clear the procedures required and what may be considered when a leave of absence request form is completed.

We will collect unwanted excellent condition logo school uniform too (polo, cardigans and jumpers) plus any unwanted winter coats.



Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS)

As part of our 'Amazing Animals' theme, this week, we have journeyed to the African grasslands to meet safari animals. The children have enjoyed our text of the week 'The Ugly Five' and other safari themed stories and factual texts.




While learning about safari animals, the children have enjoyed exploring different animal patterns and matching these to the animal. They created their own stories with our small world animals and described the animals by writing labels and captions about them.



Using their creative skills, the children made a pair of binoculars and decorated them with animal prints. Later in the week, they enjoyed going on a safari around the school grounds. They followed a map to locate safari animals that were hiding around school. This was great fun!

In **phonics** this week, the children were disappointed to find out that they weren't learning a new phoneme! Instead, they have continued to practise the **digraphs** (two letters that make one sound) and **trigraphs** (three letters that make one sound) that have been taught this half -term. The children have also learnt how to read longer words by splitting them into syllables. These included words like, sun/set – sunset, pic/nic – picnic and chick/en – chicken. Some of these words need us to practise saying them with different phonemes, for example, lem-on (lemun). When this word is sounded out and blended, it doesn't quite sound how most of us pronounce the word lemon!



In **maths** this week, we have explored the length and height of objects. The children have used words like short, longer, shortest and tall or tallest. They practised comparing lengths by looking at them and measuring them with cubes. There was also much excitement about the competition to see who could build the tallest tower!

Next week, we are excited to inform you that, the children will take part in three Bikeability sessions with leaders from City of York Council's team. There will be 30 minute sessions on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, practising cycling skills on balance bikes. The children will be wearing helmets and will be supervised by both qualified instructors and our school staff. We shall let you know how they get on via Tapestry.

Key Stage 1 (Years 1 & 2)

This week in Key Stage One, there has been lots of hard work and exciting learning taking place. We have continued to be fascinated with our new history topic about Florence Nightingale. We started to look in more detail at the life of Florence and the circumstances that led to her



becoming such an influential figure in history. This week, we learned about her early life and how she defied the expectations of rich women at the time by following her drive to be a nurse rather than marry and have children. Florence believed that God intended her to help other people and she even defied her own parents in order to do it. We thought about how hard it must have been for her and what we would have to do to follow our own dreams.

In science, we have been conducting practical investigations using our knowledge of materials and their properties. We tested different samples of material for absorbency so that we could select the best one to design a new mop for Florence to clean Scutari hospital. We used our observations to draw conclusions and select the material that was most effective at soaking up water. We also designed new coats for the soldiers to wear. We wanted them to stay as dry and warm as possible,



so we tested material samples to see which ones would help to do that. After testing, we picked the most waterproof material as the one that should be used to make the coats.



In English, we took the role of Florence Nightingale herself and wrote letters in-character. We received a letter from Queen Victoria herself! The Queen had heard of Florence's amazing exploits and was offering her support. She was interested in the conditions in Scutari hospital and wanted to know what she could do to help. We used our historical knowledge to plan and write a response, ensuring that our letters were suitably formal. Our letters answered all of the Queen's questions and we are looking forward to seeing if she writes back.

On 31st March, we are offering the chance for family and friends to come and experience this history topic for themselves. We shall be inviting parents and carers into school from 3 o'clock so that they can see the amazing work that the children have done as part of their learning. You will also get the chance to meet Florence herself, as she will be in school that day. We can't wait to see as many of you there as possible!

In the meantime, well done Key Stage 1 for wowing us yet again with your enthusiasm and hunger for learning.

Lower Key Stage 2 (Years 3 & 4)

It has been a super week in Lower Key Stage 2!



This half term our RE topic is titled 'Why is the Bible important to Christians?' In previous weeks, the children have discussed and learnt about how the Bible is a sacred book and a guide for Christians. They then went on to look at how the Bible is divided up into different sections and how it uses lots of different stories to guide Christians. This week, the children focused on the creation story. To begin with, they

recalled the story using picture prompts of the seven days. Then, in groups, they used dance movements, actions and percussion instruments to symbolise each day. The children's creativity shone through and they retold the story through dance and music brilliantly.





In computing, we have started our new topic 'Branching Databases' this week. A branching database is used to classify groups of objects such as fruits or musical instruments and helps us to identify objects by answering 'yes' and 'no' questions. The children were introduced to the topic by forming questions with yes and no answers for a group of fruits that would separate them into two groups. They then formed their own questions to separate musical instruments and animals into different categories.



Throughout the week, as part of Children's mental health week, the Year 3 and 4 children have taken part in assemblies and a variety of activities around the theme 'Know Yourself, Grow Yourself'. The children have identified their feelings well and have shown a good understanding of strategies that they can use linking these to the Zones of Regulation. They have also talked openly

about when they find things challenging and how to change their mindset to a 'can do' approach.

There has been a real buzz in Year 3 and 4 around our performance this week. The children have been amazing during our first few rehearsals and we are extremely impressed with how well they are getting into character, learning the dance routines and following the given stage directions.






Upper Key Stage 2 (Years 5 & 6)

Parallel circuit



We have completed our science unit on electricity. In our final lesson, we learnt about parallel circuits and, through investigation, identified the impact of adding or removing bulbs from the circuit. We then discussed the reasons why, and where, parallel circuits are used in everyday life. We recorded our findings within a conclusion, thinking about what we had learnt and what future experiments we might conduct.

In English lessons, we have been learning about the various types of persuasion. We have looked at a variety of examples and have identified the key features of persuasive texts: catch phrases, slogans, emotive vocabulary and rhetorical questions. We then created a word bank and utilised this to write our own persuasive sentences. We considered which aspects of Year 5 and 6 writing we could include, such as subjunctive form and passive voice, and utilised these in our writing.





We thoroughly enjoyed our trip to see 'Mary Poppins' at Joseph Rowntree School this week. We were in awe at the standard of the performance. It was so lovely to see some familiar faces in the cast and supporting crew. On our return, it was nice to receive compliments about how the children conducted themselves as we walked to and from the school.
