

On Monday we had our wellbeing support coach Matt Messias in school. He delivered an assembly about being respectful and showing integrity. Matt talked about the impact on ourselves and others when we are not respectful and we lack integrity; this can continue to impact us as we get older. He also talked about how infectious a smile can



be and we are pleased to see so many more children smiling. Matt especially works with our Year 6 children to support them to develop resilience in preparation for secondary school and future life. He also met with our current Year 6 wellbeing ambassadors who have had a really positive impact in supporting children at break times and we are working with Matt to develop and expand the beneficial effect that peer to peer support can have.

Also on Monday, local author, Tony Bower, led creative writing sessions with the KS1 children centered around the Easter story. It was a fantastic experience for the children to explore their creativity, express their ideas, and learn how to bring events to life through writing. Tony also worked with our Year 5 children writing poems about the Easter story too from the perspective of an object e.g. cross, nail, boulder; this is not an easy task to achieve. This included a fun assembly, in which it was great to hear children and staff talk about their experiences of reading and the books that really got them hooked into reading for pleasure. We are asking children to '**Do Something Funny for Money'**; this could be by wearing red from head to toe, wearing their brightest socks or wearing something that makes them smile.



Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS)

This week has been 'The Gingerbread Man' week.

The children have enjoyed exploring the story of The Gingerbread Man and variations of this story, The Runaway Chapatti and The Runaway Pizza. The children have enjoyed reading and comparing the stories. They have also acted out the story with characters.



Additional learning opportunities, based on these books, have included baking our own gingerbread men, creating a gingerbread man face by cutting and sticking, and creating a story map of the story, The Gingerbread Man.

Our phonics lessons this week have consolidated the teaching of 'air' and 'er'. We have practised reading and writing words with these phonemes and also practised reading words which have digraphs (two letters that make one sound) with double letters, for example, rr, gg, bb and dd. Some of the words read this week include rubber, shimmer and digger. To practise these phonemer



read this week include rubber, shimmer and digger. To practise these phonemes at home, please refer to the phonics homework activity.


In **maths** this week, we have compared numbers within 10. This included picking up two handfuls of counters, counting them out onto a tens frame and then comparing which tens frame had more/fewer counters. The children have also continued to learn about the numbers 9 and 10 and practised writing them.





As the weather has been fine (on some days) this week, the children have greatly enjoyed exploring the provision in our outdoor classroom. Some activities have included, building with the large construction equipment, acting out stories and practising gross motor skills in the physical development area.

On Thursday, the children really enjoyed celebrating World Book Day. The day started with a whole school assembly. Then the children took part in a range of reading based activities throughout the day. These included, a traditional tales character hunt, reading with the Year 5 and 6 children,



learning how to draw a gingerbread man and the day ended with a traditional tales story marathon. It was also great to chat about the costumes that children had chosen to wear for the day.





Key Stage 1 (Years 1 & 2)

It was a particularly exciting week this week, with World Book Day bringing lots of fun and encouraging a love of reading. It was so lovely to see all the amazing, colourful costumes that the teachers (and staff) wore to school. We were very excited to be able to take part in a special online "Footy and Booky" webinar on Zoom. There were lots of famous faces to spot; players from men's and women's



teams across the country. Then there was a quiz with questions about books and football and maybe even both at the same time. We managed to score 14 points! After that, the whole of Key Stage 1 came together as a group to show off our costumes and have more World Book Day fun with quizzes and activities. We also joined together with children from Years 3 and 4 to read and share stories. After World Book Day, we wrote recounts about the fun we had and described our costumes. It was a wonderful event and really created a buzz around reading, inspiring lots of us to pick up a book and let our minds go on an adventure!



It wasn't just books that got us excited this week though. We have loved our art topic about printing too. Last week, we experimented with different materials dipped in paint to see what interesting shapes and patterns they produced when pressed on paper. This week, we used that knowledge to create our own printing tiles. We took a square of stout card and cut lengths of string, which we twisted and curled into a design. Carefully, these were rolled or dipped into pain and then pressed onto paper to create a printed

pattern. Because the title was used over and over again, the result was a repeated pattern. We had so much fun doing it and our artwork was amazing at the end.

In computing, we have been looking at pictograms. We learned about data and what it meant, thinking about the different sorts of information and the questions that it could answer. We thought about how data could be collected and the easiest and most efficient ways to present it. A pictogram is like a block graph, using pictures to



represent the information visually. We made a practical pictogram to answer the question of what our favourite fruit was. We then used this data to make pictograms on the computer. After that, we conducted our own data collection investigations and made our own pictograms to show what we found out.

Well done Key Stage 1. It is always such a delight to be with you on your learning adventure.

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
Lower Key Stage 2 (Years 3 & 4)



In PSHE, the children built upon what they had learnt last week about 'drugs' common to everyday life such as cigarettes, vaping, alcohol and medicines. They started by looking at the impact some these can have on our health and wellbeing. For example, they discovered that caffeine, contained in many energy drinks, can make your heart beat much faster and give you a headache. They also learnt that is illegal to buy alcohol if you are under 18 years of age. Next, the children discussed the terms addiction and habit

and the differences between the two. To support our debating skills, specifically listening respectfully and valuing the opinions of others, we spoke about whether video games could be considered just as dangerous as some other common drugs because people can become addicted to them.

In mathematics this week, all three classes have begun learning about fractions. At the beginning of the week, they were asked to identify the denominators of unit fractions and then the numerators of non-unit fractions within a variety of contexts. The children then explored the concept of the 'whole'. They learnt that when the numerator is less than the denominator the fraction is less than a whole but when the numerator and



denominator are the same the fraction is equal to one whole. Finally, the children were set the challenge of comparing and ordering unit fractions. Well done to everyone for their positivity and resilience in maths this week!



In science on Tuesday, to celebrate Mars Day, we took part in an interactive livestream show called 'To the Moon and Mars.' The children were part of a virtual space mission to the moon called Artemis. The children learnt about space travel, what it is like to be an astronaut and even got to vote on their choice of rocket to blast our astronauts into space. Once our astronauts landed safely on the south pole of the moon, the children had one more important

decision to make - who would step out on to the moon's surface first? Would it be Rosemary Coogan, who would become the first woman on the moon? John McFall, who would become the first doctor and olympic medallist on the moon or would they vote for Lunar the dog! Let's just say it was one small step for Lunar, one giant leap for mankind!"

Upper Key Stage 2 (Years 5 & 6)

In our English lessons this week, we have started a narrative unit based on a short film called The Wishgranter. In this short animation, we find out that beneath each wishing well lives a small creature - a mythical granter of wishes. This Wishgranter is quite apathetic but when a wish for love becomes stuck in the well mechanism, then the Wishgranter



springs into action. Although not everything goes to plan, all is well in the end! In order to engage the reader, within our writing we need to include description, action and dialogue. We have started our written work by consolidating our use of direct speech and sentence openers.



As part of our RE lessons, we began our exploration of charity, art and faith. In this unit, we will reflect upon the importance of art and architecture in religion whilst also considering why some believers see generosity and charity as more important than buildings and art. Over the coming weeks, we will look at the art and architecture of different faiths.

The Year 6 pupils welcomed Mr Messias, who is working with them, to guide them in how to be more resilient and develop a positive growth mindset. This experience will be valuable as the year progresses and we move towards secondary school. We have additional sessions planned, which we hope will support the year group with their learning, over the coming months and later life. The Wellbeing Ambassadors continued their training with Matt Messias. They discussed what their role involves, which adults they can approach for support, scenarios they may encounter and discussed ways in which they could support individuals most effectively.

We would like to remind the Year 5s, who are taking part in Bikeability training this half-term, that it is on Thursday 13^{th} and Friday 14^{th} .

Class 10 would like to thank their parents, carers and siblings for their support whilst they performed their assembly.
