Acting Deputy Headteacher's Message

Welcome back to a new half-term! We hope everyone had a restful time over the holidays. It has been lovely to see the children all excited to continue their learning journey this term.

As you know, we aim to promote a strong **love of reading** across the whole school and I would like to share with you some theory behind why we do so.

Reading with your child is one of the most powerful ways to support their learning and wellbeing. It's not just about schoolwork - it's about connection, curiosity and developing a lifelong love of reading.

Recent research shows that children who read for enjoyment have stronger literacy skills and do better in school overall. The National Literacy Trust found that children who enjoy reading are twice as likely to have above-average reading ability. Studies from UCL's Centre for Longitudinal Studies show that children read to at age 5 achieve better exam results at 16 and maintain stronger vocabularies into adulthood.

Reading for pleasure also improves mental wellbeing, empathy, creativity and even performance in subjects like maths.

Sharing books with your child such as reading aloud, taking turns or simply talking about stories, does far more than improve literacy. It:

- · Builds vocabulary and comprehension
- Models enthusiasm and curiosity
- · Strengthens emotional bonds
- · Encourages empathy and imagination

Research shows that children whose parents/carers enjoy reading are much more likely to develop that same love. In one study, 81% of children whose parents/carers liked reading also enjoyed it themselves.

Simple Ways to Foster a Love of Reading

- 1. Make it part of your routine Ten minutes a day is enough. Choose a cosy time such as bedtime, after dinner or a quiet weekend moment and make it enjoyable.
- 2. Let your child choose Choice fuels motivation. Comic books, magazines, audiobooks and non-fiction all count what matters is that they are engaged.
- 3. Share your excitement React together laugh, wonder and predict what might happen next. Your enthusiasm is contagious.
- 4. Talk about what you read Ask open questions: "What would you have done?" or "Why do you think that happened?" This helps children think deeply and builds comprehension.
- 5. Keep reading aloud Even confident readers love being read to. It exposes them to richer language and helps maintain enjoyment.

The Lasting Impact

Reading together helps children see books as a source of pleasure and discovery - not just schoolwork. It builds confidence, empathy and imagination, laying the foundation for lifelong learning.

Thank you for helping nurture a love of reading - one story at a time.

Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS)



A huge welcome back to our wonderful Reception children! We have loved hearing about the children's busy half term breaks. They have returned filled with enthusiasm and wonder for another exciting topic; 'Let's celebrate'. This half term, we will be learning about lots of different festivals and celebrations including the children's own birthday celebrations.

In phonics, we have been so pleased with how the children have retained the phonemes learnt so far! We have learnt three new diagraphs this week; ff, ll, ss and the phoneme j. Children have also resumed their reading practice sessions and are enjoying discussing the stories within our wordless and worded books.

In **maths**, this week, the children have continued to explore their understanding of number with a focus on the number 4 and 5. They have experimented with addition skills by finding different ways that these numbers can be made. For example, a ladybird can have 3 and 2 spots making 5 altogether.





After learning about how to be safe at Bonfire Night celebrations, the children have completed firework and space themed activities in our areas of provision. The children also practised their writing skills to add describing words to their marble rolled firework scenes. It is amazing to see the segmenting being used to spell and write words like pop, whizz (wizz) and bang.

This week, the children have also begun to learn some of our nativity songs. We hope they will soon be singing them to you at home!





Thank you for sharing entries of your half-term activities on Tapestry. It has been lovely for the children to share these with us.

Key Stage 1 (Years 1 & 2)



It was so lovely to see everyone back after a well-deserved break. We hope that everyone enjoyed their week off. We certainly came back to school with a bang: in English we were writing firework poems inspired by Bonfire Night. We were dazzled by the sights and sounds of fireworks and collected vocabulary to describe the colours and movements as well as the nouns of objects associated with the event. After grouping these alphabetically, we used our words to write acrostic poems. In an acrostic poem, each line of the poem needs to start with the first letter of a key word (e.g. "firework"). Using our word banks, we wrote gorgeous poems that really captured the sensations of Bonfire

Night. Afterwards, we produced some stunning firework art. Thank you to all the people who sent in a cardboard tube. The children made stamps by cutting strips into the end of the tubes and splaying them out, like spokes. These were then dipped into paint and used to print on paper. The effect was of explosions of colour in the night sky. It was so simple to do but so effective!





In maths, we have been working on subtraction. We explored the concept of "taking away" both practically and visually, especially how the number gets smaller. We learned some of the vocabulary associated with subtraction and thought about real life situations in which subtraction applies, such as when eating items of food or giving objects away. We then linked this to the skills and knowledge we had developed before half term, developing written and diagrammatic methods such as

the use of number lines to solve subtraction problems. The children worked carefully and it was lovely to see their confidence as they solved problems.

We have continued to learn about habitats but this week we've looked further afield to explore global habitats and climate. In geography, we learned about polar regions and we looked at the world map and where The Arctic and Antarctica were in relation to the Equator. We learned that the climate of these regions was extremely cold and that the animals who live there need to be specially adapted to survive. In science, we learned more about this and identified which animals live in which region. We were interested to learn that,



although the climates were very similar for both, the animals that lived there were completely different!

Well done everyone. It was lovely to see you all back in school and we are proud of what a great start you have made to this half term.

Lower Key Stage 2 (Years 3 & 4)


It was lovely to welcome the children back after the half term holiday and to make a start on all the exciting learning we have in store over the coming weeks.



This week, the children have considered the meaning of this half term's big question, 'Do I have to?'. This question is linked to the fundamental British Value 'Rule of Law'. As part of their learning, the children were asked about what rules they have at home and in school. The children were also asked to consider what would happen if we didn't have our three overarching school ex-

pectations, 'Be Ready', 'Be Respectful' and Be Safe'. After discussing the rules that they follow, the children identified that as a society we all have rules to abide by - they are the law. We all agreed that although there are some rules that we don't like or would like to change, they are needed to ensure the safety and equal treatment of everyone. The children then identified what the consequences of breaking the law would be compared to breaking a rule in school. At the end of the lesson, we all agreed that rules are vitally important in our lives so that everyone can feel safe and respected.

In science this week, the children have been fascinated to learn about the human digestive system. They learnt some key scientific vocabulary including oesophagus, stomach, intestines and rectum and the important role each one of them plays in the digestion process. Next lesson, the children are already looking forward to producing their own colourful story board to illustrate the journey of something they eat through their own digestive system.



A massive well done to Class 6 for their wonderful Egyptian Extravaganza class assembly on Friday afternoon. Class 7 and 8 thoroughly enjoyed watching it and it was a fantastic reminder of all the things we have been learning about in History. We hope that Class 6 parents / carers enjoyed it as much as we did performing it for you.

Upper Key Stage 2 (Years 5 & 6)

Year 5

While the Year 6 children have been away, in English we focused on a series of 'slow writes', giving us the chance to work together as a class to craft well-considered pieces of writing. We took time to select sentence structures deliberately for effect, ensured our paragraphs flowed coherently while avoiding repetition, and carefully chose vocabulary to convey our ideas precisely. Throughout the process, we reflected on our choices and shared constructive feedback with one another, helping us



to refine our work. By the end of the lessons, we had developed a much clearer understanding of how to structure writing effectively and how to make our ideas engaging and purposeful.



In reading, we continued to deepen our understanding of different question types and explored effective strategies for finding accurate answers. We focused on studying texts carefully before attempting each question, paying close attention to key details, vocabulary and the overall meaning. After completing the questions, we worked collaboratively as a class to discuss the strengths of our responses and identify areas where our answers could be

improved. Through these discussions, we learned how to justify our thinking with evidence from the text and to consider alternative perspectives.

Throughout the autumn term, we have been learning to play the ukulele. We began by exploring how to hold the instrument correctly and how to strum in time with a steady beat. As we became more confident, we learned to play a range of basic chords and started performing simple songs together as a class. Throughout our lessons, we have improved our sense of rhythm, listening skills and ability to work as a group. Learning the ukulele has been a fun and rewarding experience and we are proud of how much progress we have made.
