

- Dogs must not walk on the school playground. If essential, smaller dogs may be carried.


Scooters/Bikes on School Playground








#### **Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS)**

Our focus this week has continued to be 'minibeast that live on the ground', particularly butterflies. One of our favourite themed stories has been The Very Hungry Caterpillar! This story has led to some brilliant writing, where the children segmented words to spell and write the foods that the caterpillar ate.

During the week, the children have had the opportunity to learn about the life cycle of the butterfly and explore their symmetrical wing patterns. They have learned the different stages of the life cycle from egg to butterfly and even learnt a song about it!

We have also been delighted to see that our Reception caterpillars are emerging from their chrysalis state. The children have been delighted to see them flying around their new homes and watching them feeding with their proboscis.

In maths, we have focussed on subtraction number sentences. To calculate these, the children have used tens frames and number stories.

For example,

First, there were 8 cakes,

Then, 3 were eaten,

Now, there are 5 cakes.

The children are really impressing us with their developing maths skills and mathematical vocabulary.

In phonics, we have continued to learn how to read and spell words with adjacent consonants. We continue to be 'blown away' by the children's enthusiasm for reading. They are using their phonics skills and knowledge to assist them in their progress. New tricky words learnt this week are, **there**, **when**, **what** and **one**.



This week, the children have also been practising their speech and language by singing days of the week songs to ensure they know the correct order and where each day comes during the week. We have also been learning about idioms. An idiom is a saying that we often use which means something different, for example, "you blew my socks off." This obviously doesn't mean

that you have no socks but that your work was amazing! The accompanying picture may give you some ideas of ones which you could use at home with your children.

#### Reminder

Next week, Class 1 will be visiting Haxby library to change their books. Please remember to put the books and the library card in your child's book bag. Thank you.

During this recent warm weather, the children are thoroughly enjoying accessing our areas of provision in the outdoor classroom. To ensure children are safe in the sun, we insist that children wear a hat. If your child has a hat that they would like to wear at school, please write their name on it and put them in book bags.

# Key Stage 1 (Years 1 & 2)



We may have had one less day at school but out superstar children still managed to shine just as brightly! And shining stars was a theme for the week as we learned about the history of space exploration. We started in history by going back in time over 400 years and learning about how Galileo improved and used

the world's first telescopes to make discoveries about space, such as the sun being at the centre of the solar system and the surface of the moon being covered with

craters and mountains rather than being smooth. His discoveries revolutionised our understanding of space and have influenced the history of astronomy and space exploration ever since. Continuing the space theme, we took inspiration to create our own space poetry. Focusing on descriptive and figurative language, we used adjectives and adverbs in our work before presenting them beautifully on a shaped template.



On Wednesday and Thursday some visitors from MEG came into school to work with all three classes on a special drumming workshop. They brought traditional African drums called djembe drums for us to play. The children learned about how the different parts of their hand could produce different sounds and put these together to come up with paired compositions. They then worked as a whole class to perform a class composition by maintaining a steady pulse and concentrating only on their own section. The children loved it and our visitors were very impressed with them.





In maths this week, we have been focusing on subtraction. We revised a variety of different subtraction methods, such as the use of objects and jottings and the use of number lines and number squares. After consolidating our understanding, we solved a variety of different puzzles and problems. We also revised what we knew about reading the time of analogue clocks. We read the time to 5 minute intervals and then applied what we knew to special space-themed word problems.

It really has been an out-of-this-world week. Keep up the good work everyone!

# Lower Key Stage 2 (Years 3 & 4)

Another brilliant week in Lower Key Stage 2.

In design technology, the children have looked at a variety of different sock puppets and designed their own by drawing and annotating their design. Whilst designing their sock puppet the children thought carefully about the equipment they would need to make it. They also carefully considered other materials that they would require in addition to their sock such as felt for the eyes and wool for the hair. Afterwards, the children discussed the best way to create their sock puppet and created 8 steps to follow during the making process. We are all hopeful that our old socks are going to turn into great sock puppets.





Our whole class reading sessions over the last two weeks have linked to our World War II topic. The children have looked at a non-fiction text about the Blitz and letters from an evacuee and an evacuee's Mum. During these sessions, the children have retrieved information, made inferences about how the people writing the letters feel and formed predictions based on the information they have read. Their comprehension skills were fabulous! We are all looking forward to starting our new class novel next week 'Friend or Foe' by Michael Morpurgo. A massive thank you to our amazing PTA for funding this new class novel that links brilliantly with our

World War II topic.

This week in science, the children have continued to explore forces and how different surfaces cause different amounts of friction. To investigate this, the children designed an investigation using a car on a ramp with different surfaces including wood, plastic, carpet, sandpaper and rubber. After making their predictions, the children carried out the

investigation by placing the car at the top of the ramp and lifting it by 1cm at a time. They then recorded the height that the car started to move. Next week, the children will be creating their own bar chart to represent their results.



Well done to Class 7 for a fantastic assembly. It was brilliant to see the children share all the wonderful things they have learnt about so far this year.

# **Upper Key Stage 2 (Years 5 & 6)**

In history, the Year 5s have begun to learn about the Ancient Greeks. They started by using maps to find the location of Greece and identified key geographical features of the region and why these made it difficult for the different island communities to unite. Despite these many



physical obstacles, the Greek islands managed to prosper. They then considered how we know so much about Greek lives and culture. This included discussing the process of archaeology investigations and the way knowledge is recorded and passed down through generations. To their surprise, many aspects of Greek culture are still present in today's society and throughout the world: democracy and the Olympic Games.



As part of our maths lessons this week, Mr Tod's set learnt about the conversion of measurements. This involved changing units of measure from one to another, such as converting kilograms into grams, millilitres to litres, millimetres into centimetres, into metres and kilometres. This involved multiplying or dividing by 10, 100 or 1000. In Mr Bennett's set and Mrs Fitzpatrick and Mrs Stephenson's set, we have revisited many aspects of the mathematical curriculum, for example fractions, decimals and

percentages, measuring and calculating angles, coordinates, rounding, and calculating the perimeter, area and volume of a variety of 2D and 3D shapes.

In English this week, in Class 11 and 10, we focused on the accurate use of punctuation and grammar to answer a range of grammatical based questions. In Class 9, due to Bikeability and the recent class assembly, we wrote our own non-chronological report based on the Industrial Revolution this week. In order to engage the reader, it was necessary to consider the chronology and cohesion of the facts that



we included in our paragraphs. We also had to ensure that we wrote in a formal voice whilst also including the Year 5 writing features.

Just to remind you that Year 6 SATs start on Monday 13<sup>th</sup> May. The children are continuing to impress us with their determination and positivity during lessons. Alongside regular reading practise, we would also encourage the children to continue to refer to the maths and spelling recall sheets given out at Parents' Evening. Please make sure that your child has a relaxing weekend and comes in to school on Monday with a positive frame of mind to do their best.


