Plea - Christmas Cards by Thursday 18th December






Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS)



We are so very proud of all the children's performance of A Wriggly Nativity, they certainly put on a sparkling performance. Their singing was beautiful and they have done an amazing job of learning their roles. Thank you again for all your help with the costumes and your kind messages after the show.

In **phonics**, we have been revising and consolidating the learning of the forty sounds taught since the beginning of the autumn term. What an achievement! We continue to work very hard to learn how to sound out and blend words so we can read them and segment words into different sounds that we can hear when writing.



In **literacy**, the children have used their fantastic segmenting skills to write a list for Father Christmas. Some children have also written captions and sentences, for example, **a red hat** or **It is a rag doll**. They are becoming much more confident at segmenting words to spell them and recognising sentences/phrases. Maybe they could write a Christmas list for you at home!

Christmas activities have continued in the Reception classrooms this week and we have enjoyed lots of Christmas learning in our independent play. The most popular activity this week has definitely been a scissor control activity where the children had to cut Father Christmas' beard following the lines carefully.





We are looking forward to lots more Christmas activities next week, including our Grandparents' Christmas craft morning (on Monday), and of course Christmas dinner and our Christmas party (on Wednesday) and don't forget Christmas singing on the playground (on Thursday)!

Key Stage 1 (Years 1 & 2)

Wow, Key Stage 1! Weren't you fabulous during our nativity performances? It was wonderful to see all of the hard work and practice come together so well when we performed on Monday and Tuesday to our families and friends. There was music, signing, dancing, acting and narrating and we really shone like the Christmas stars that we are. The children who narrated or acted had such loud, clear, confident voices in front of an



audience. The dancers were truly dazzling and the musicians did a fantastic job of playing in time with the music. It was a truly magical performance and we were all so proud of you. Thank you to all of the families who helped by supporting children with learning their lines and by providing such amazing costumes.



This week hasn't only been about the nativity story, though. In English, we have continued to be inspired by the story "The Runaway Iceberg". We created our very own versions by selecting our own arctic animals that could go on an adventure at sea when their iceberg cracked and broke off. The children have really enjoyed this story and worked independently on these versions. Their enjoyment really shone through in the language

choices and sentence structures that they used. They wrote fabulously engaging stories that were a joy to read. Well done key Stage 1!

As you know, the children have been enjoying their dance lessons with Mrs Topliss this half term. This week, we were looking at the skill of artistic abstraction as we drew inspiration for our movements from watching a silk scarf and the way it fell to the floor. We worked with a partner to create a dance "sentence" of 6 elements, including all the things that we have worked on so far. This included balances, shapes, circular movements and



pathways. We then watched each other's sequences, all the while thinking about how we could challenge ourselves and think creatively.

We would like to remind everyone that on Monday morning, adults are invited to stay in the playground after morning drop-off for a special Christmas singing performance from our Key Stage 1 children. They will be performing some of the nativity songs to help get us in the Christmas mood. Then, after that, we will be inviting our families into school to work with the children for our Grandparents Christmas Craft morning. We are really excited to share such a lovely experience with so many members of our families.

Well done Key Stage 1. There is just one magical week left to go before the holidays.

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Lower Key Stage 2 (Years 3 & 4)

In the penultimate week of the Autumn Term, despite the appearance of one or two mischievous elves and tinsel, the children have continued to display positivity, enthusiasm and focus towards their learning.





In geography, the children have continued to deepen their understanding of rivers. This week, the focus has been on the water cycle. The children learnt the various steps of the cycle including evaporation, condensation, precipitation and collection and they recalled the different states of matter

occurring in each of these stages. To demonstrate how the water cycle works, the children drew the steps on a sandwich bag. The sandwich bag was then taped to the window. Whilst on the window, the water began to evaporate and form droplets on the inside of the bag. When the droplets became large, or joined together with other droplets, they ran down the inside of the bag (precipitation) back into the water at the bottom (collection). The children thoroughly enjoyed seeing the process in action and now realise that puddles on the playground don't simply disappear by magic!





In English this week, the children have really impressed us with their independent writing skills. They were set the challenge of writing their own non-chronological report all about the River Nile. After writing a really engaging introduction to hook the reader, they then went on to write paragraphs, remembering to include appropriate sub-headings, about the

River Nile's location and the African countries it flows through, its two tributaries, the source and mouth and, finally, the flooding season in both Ancient Egyptian times and nowadays. To complete their written work, they wrote a conclusion which reminded the reader what they had learnt about and encouraged them to impress their friends with their knowledge of the longest river in the world. Well done to everyone for trying their very best to showcase what they have been learning about in lessons over the last few weeks.

This half-term, all three Lower Junior classes have visited Haxby Hall. They have shared songs, dances and even their best jokes and the residents have loved hearing all about what the children have been learning about back in school. Just watching two different generations



coming together to chat and laugh with each other is a truly magical and heart-warming experience and the positive feedback received from their staff about all our children was lovely to hear. After Christmas, other classes throughout the school will have an opportunity to visit as well and I'm sure they will get as much out of it as the Lower Junior children clearly have. A big thank you to all the adult volunteers who have accompanied us we couldn't do it without your support!

Upper Key Stage 2 (Years 5 & 6)

As part of our work in RE, we have been learning about how different faiths use their place of worship and why these spaces matter to the people who visit them. This week, we focused on Christianity and explored the many reasons a church holds such importance for



Christians. We discussed how a church is not only a place where believers gather to worship, pray and celebrate key festivals, but also a centre of community life. We found that churches often act as community hubs, offering emotional and physical support to those who need it. Activities such as food banks, support groups, charity events and social gatherings all help to bring people together and strengthen the sense of belonging within the local area. Additionally, we learnt that some Christians feel close to God not only in a church building but also in places of natural beauty. For them, landscapes such as mountains, forests or the seashore can hold a similar spiritual significance, providing a peaceful space for reflection and a sense of connection with creation.



In our DT sessions, we have been focused on bringing our own steam locomotive designs to life. Before we could begin building, we spent time creating detailed technical drawings and blueprints to guide our ideas. Once our plans were complete, we moved on to the practical stage of the project. We have been busy measuring materials with accuracy, cutting each piece to size and assembling the different parts of our design. A great deal of care has gone into shaping the boiler, cab and wheels so that

they not only look realistic but also fit together securely. After this, we used glue and other joining techniques to construct our 3D steam locomotives, watching our sketches gradually transform into solid models. The project has challenged us to develop precision, patience and creativity.

As we come to the end of reading the Oliver Twist novel in our guided reading sessions, we have spent time reflecting on the journey we have taken through the story. Over the past few weeks, we have followed Oliver from the harsh conditions of the workhouse to the dangers of Fagin's gang and finally towards the safety and kindness he deserves. Along the way, we have explored Dickens' language, examined the historical setting and discussed how the characters' actions shape Oliver's fate.
