Christmas Celebrations at St Mary's Church

Reception classes





In **phonics**, we have been revising and consolidating the learning of the forty sounds taught since the beginning of the autumn term. What an achievement! We continue to work very hard to learn how to blend words so we can read words and segment words into different sounds that we can hear when writing.





In **literacy**, the children have used their fantastic segmenting skills to write a list for Father Christmas. Some children have also written captions and sentences, for example, **a red hat** or **It is a rag doll**. They are becoming much more confident at segmenting words to spell them and recognising sentences/phrases. Maybe they could write a Christmas list for you at home!



Key Stage 1 (Years 1 & 2)

It's beginning to look a lot like Christmas in Key Stage 1 but the children are still working hard and having a great time on their learning adventures.

First of all, wow! What an incredible job our children did with their nativity! After weeks of tireless preparation, they performed to the school on Monday morning and to friends and family on Monday and Tuesday afternoons. Anyone who saw it, agreed that it was a marvellous show with excellent performances from our children: beautiful singing, graceful dancing and confident speaking, not to mention the



stunning costumes. Well done everyone, you did yourselves (and us) proud. We were particularly proud at how confident the children were when performing to a live audience. Super job, everyone!



But, the music and song didn't stop there! We have also been working hard to rehearse and prepare for our Christmas church service next week too. There are special songs that we have been practising alongside the whole school which we will sing during the festive service. It is so lovely to take the time to think about the true meaning of Christmas at this busy and exciting time and the children have done so well to learn a complicated

song and sing it so beautifully. It is definitely going to be a highlight of the Christmas period.

In English, we have been writing festive riddles to describe mystery Christmas characters and objects.

We learned about the features of riddles and the different sentence types that are used. We then used a sequence of statements to give clues, including using ambitious adjectives for description and then finished with a question to encourage our reader to take a guess. We came up with some very clever riddles with amazing clues and it was lots of fun to try and guess what the answers were.

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Lower Key Stage 2 (Years 3 & 4)

Year 3 and 4 have had another brilliant week.

This week, the children have rounded off their 'From Flint to Iron' topic in both history and English. The children have thoroughly enjoyed all the learning opportunities this topic has offered; building the round houses, learning about changes in food from hunter gathering to farming, understanding how bronze and iron were made, and how early humans began to settle and build communities.

In history, the children have recalled the information they have learnt and summarised it on a double page




spread. As part of this, the children wrote about the prehistoric periods of time (from the Stone Age to the Iron Age) in chronological order. Within the Stone Age section, they revisited the Palaeolithic Age and wrote about how early humans were nomads who foraged for food and hunter gathered. During the New Stone Age, in the Neolithic Age, hunter gathering had stopped and people began to farm. Thousands of years later, during the Bronze Age, people had learnt how to make bronze using

a process called smelting. Finally, iron was discovered which was easier to make, easily available and stronger than bronze. Throughout these three periods, homes changed drastically. The children recalled the hillforts Iron Age people built to protect themselves from enemy tribes through the use of mounds, ditches, high walls and guarded gates.

In English, the children have completed their own non-chronological reports based on the Palaeolithic Age and

the Neolithic Age. The children used the information they had learnt from history and wrote their reports using a variety of writing features that included fronted adverbials of time, such as 'During the Palaeolithic Age,' fronted adverbials of manner, such as 'interestingly' and subordinating conjunctions, such as 'because' and 'as'. The children have done amazingly and it has been wonderful to read the brilliant, factual reports they have written.

Upper Key Stage 2 (Years 5 & 6)

In science, we have concluded our work on space and the Earth by collating all of our learning into one document. Whilst completing this task, we were free to choose how we presented our work. Many of us decided to include some exciting diagrams alongside detailed explanations. This included information about what we had learnt throughout this topic: heliocentric versus geocentric, the planets in our solar system, cycles of the moon and rotation of the Earth.





In RE this week, we learnt about Christianity and generosity. We were taught that many Christians, as part of their worship, will give money to charity. Some give up to 10% (sometimes called 'tithing') and it is based on a practice from before the time of Jesus in the Bible. We were taught that various organisations - such as Christian Aid, the Bible Society and the Salvation Army - use this money to provide aid for those most in need around the world. During this lesson, we were given the opportunity to reflect on what it means to be generous, and how generosity can be shown.

As part of our PE lessons with Mr Walton, we have been developing our football skills. This week, we have learnt to control the ball when it is passed to us using our legs and torso. Whilst playing a game of five-a-side, we were limited to the number of times we could touch the ball; this encouraged us to think quickly and look for team mates who were in space. During the lesson, we quickly realised that the most successful teams were those who communicated with each other.
