Screen Time

While technology can be a great tool for learning and entertainment, it's important to be aware of the potential dangers of excessive screen time for children. Spending too long on devices can lead to physical health issues such as eye strain, poor posture, and disrupted sleep patterns, especially if used before bedtime. Use of screen time when a child is very young is linked to long-term difficulties with attention, communication, problem-solving and social skills. It can also hinder their ability to focus on other important activities like reading, outdoor play, or hobbies that promote creativity. Children learn best through interacting with adults and the world around them.

Top tips

- 1. Turn off background TV.
- 2. Limit your child's access to the TV, iPad/tablet/computer and phone.
- 3. Spend time playing with your child.
- 4. Talk to your child about the world around them.

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World Book Day

A message for all children 'You are a reader'!

World Book Day changes lives through a love of books and shared reading. Throughout the week, children will be taking part in a variety of reading and English activities. On the day, your child(ren), may choose to dress as their favourite character from a book, giving opportunity to utilise a costume they already have. Alternatively, they may choose to dress as a 'word' from a book e.g. blue: wearing all blue clothes, sporty: wearing their PE kit, freezing: wearing hat, scarves and gloves. As our 'Amazing Animals' theme comes to an end this week, we have explored the woodland habitat and the animals which live there. The children have explored animals' prints and sorted the animals into their woodland habitat. The have also learnt about nocturnal animals and discussed what the animals do during the night.



The children have also thoroughly enjoyed our text of the week 'Owl Babies' and other woodland themed stories and factual texts. During the week, the children retold and acted out the story 'Owl Babies' and practised their writing skills by writing labels or captions using their phonics knowledge. We are especially pleased with the enthusiasm in which the children approach their



In **phonics** this week, the children were disappointed to find out that they weren't learning a new phoneme! Instead, they have continued to practise the **digraphs** (two letters that make one sound) and trigraphs (three letters that make one sound) that have been taught this half -term. The children have consolidated their learning and used their reading and writing skills to apply their phonics knowledge.

In **maths** this week, we have learnt about time. The children explored small amounts of time, including seconds and minutes. They completed challenges to investigate how many things they could do in 30 seconds or 1 minute. This was great fun! They also sang songs to practise the sequence of the days of the week.





The children thoroughly enjoyed our Bikeability sessions on the balance bikes, this week. We hope you have enjoyed looking at the photos on Tapestry and have maybe seen an improvement in your child's cycling abilities.

As a little teaser, next half-term the children's learning will centre around traditional tales. We are looking forward to many different activities, linked to these fantastic stories.

Key Stage 1 (Years 1 & 2)

It feels very exciting to have come to the end of another half term. We can't believe that we are halfway through the year already! Key Stage 1 have been working just as hard as ever. There was exciting news this week as we received another letter from Queen Victoria, addressed to Florence

Nightingale. This time, the queen was interested in Florence's plans to spread her word and open a new college to train nurses. We asked lots of questions and we wrote another letter of response to tell her all about our plans and the help that we would need. It was wonderful to see how much the children had remembered about formal letter writing as they independently included the features that they required and wrote letters that Her Majesty would be proud to receive.






In history, we continued to learn about the events of Florence's life. This week, we looked at her reasons for volunteering to go to Scutari to help the wounded soldiers as a nurse. We looked at maps and saw how long and difficult the journey would have been, especially in Victorian times. Using our empathy skills, we thought about what that must have been like, and how she felt at the end of her journey to walk into a hospital that was filthy and smelly. We then thought of questions that we would have liked to ask Florence and drew pictures of the hospital conditions, using a check

list to ensure that we included all the relevant historical detail.

In computing, we have been thinking about the way that data can be stored and grouped. Using the context of 2D shapes, we thought about what was meant by the terms "similarities" and "grouping", using the properties of 2D shapes as examples. We verbally created sorting rules and then used the computer to drag and drop the shapes into groups, according to given sorting rules. We then broke

the process of sorting down into stages to describe the algorithm (sequence of instructions) and also the algorithm that the computer followed to mark our work and tell us if we were correct or not. It was very interesting to "think like a computer".

Thank you for all of the support that you give your children at home by reading with them, as well as to them, and discussing what you read. Engendering fluency and a love of reading early in school life is crucial and makes a phenomenal difference.

In order to ensure that the work that goes on both in and out of school is effective, the reading books are changed every week so that the children have a wide and varied range of stimulating books to enjoy as part of their reading practise.

It is extremely important that all books are returned to school on time, as sets that are missing books cannot be used in other classes. Late returns and missing or damaged books have a detrimental knock-on effect on the large number of classes that are all sharing the same bank of books. If books are lost, damaged or not returned, then it means that the entire set is unusable so we shall be asking families to pay for replacements if this is the case.

As a reminder, the Little Wandle books are changed on the following days:

EYFS: Please return your books on a Monday.

Key Stage 1: Please return your books on a Thursday.

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Lower Key Stage 2 (Years 3 & 4)



On Tuesday, it was 'Safer Internet Day 2025'. Firstly, the children recalled the numerous ways they can help to keep themselves, and others, safe online and who to tell if they are worried or concerned about anything they witness online. The children came up with some fantastic answers including not giving out personal information, not meeting up with anyone who they may have been chatting to online and recognising and reporting cyberbullying. They also

remembered from last year that they have a responsibility to use modern technology (games consoles, mobile phones and computers) appropriately and that anything they do on these devices leaves behind a digital footprint. This year's focus was thinking about how they can protect themselves, and others, from online scamming. The first key message was that some scams are too good to be true and that they should ignore emails offering amazing prizes. Another clue to scamming is receiving a message or something appearing on your screen that you did not expect. Finally, sometimes you may be asked to spend money or trade something valuable. The children completed a scamming quiz in class and we were very impressed with their understanding and responses to the scenarios posed.

In English this week, the children have been identifying the key features of a non-chronological report. To begin with, we read through a model text which looked in detail at Tropical and Arid climate zones. We then identified and discussed the purpose of key features of this type of genre including the use of main titles, sub-headings for the main paragraphs, an engaging introduction and a concise, clear conclusion.



Alongside these organisational text features, the children looked at the different types of sentence structures used. The children were able to identify the difference between a question and a statement and could recognise, and use, both co-ordinating and subordinating conjunctions to construct sentences about these climates. After half-term, the children are looking forward to having the opportunity to write their own non-chronological report based on these two climate zones, using the knowledge and understanding they have gained from this half term's geography lessons.



This term Class 6 and Class 8 are very fortunate to have a music specialist, Miss Freitas, teaching them how to play the ukulele. They have really enjoyed learning how to position their fingers on the strings in order to play different chords for example 'F Major'. In the coming weeks, the children will learn a chord sequence to accompany a well-known song which they are really excited about. Meanwhile, in Class 7, the children have been using the fantastic Charanga Music Scheme to learn all about the song 'Blackbird' by the Beatles. They have played some fun rhythm and pitch warm-up games,

learnt the words to the song, performed the song and played various instruments to accompany it. During the summer term, Class 7 will also get the opportunity to be taught by a music specialist and learn how to play the violin.

This week as part of Online Safety week, the children discussed the ways in which personal information can, and should, be kept confidential when using an online profile. We discussed the potential dangers of using the internet and how they are responsible for using a range of devices safely and appropriately. We enjoyed talking about what we had learnt in our Online Safety assemblies that took place this week.

This week, we completed our entries for the Viborg UNESCO Creative City - Media Arts initiative. This year, we were challenged to draw Angels of Hope. We had the opportunity to draft out and plan our own designs, choosing a medium that would best suit our ideas. Our angels often represented good deeds, actions and



thoughts. Though many of our drawings were symbolic, and not based on the religious definition of an angel, some of us chose to apply what we have learnt in RE across multiple faiths and from our own experiences.
