# Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS)

This week, the children in Reception have learnt about friends. They have developed their knowledge of their new friends in school by learning names, taking turns with their peers and investigating our areas together. We have also read stories about being a good friend.

Our phonics journey, this week, progressed to learning the phonemes (sounds) i, n, m and d. The children have enjoyed playing phonics games such as 'touch your...' in which the teacher 'sound talks' a body part, for example, touch your 'I-e-g'. This is a game which can be played anywhere!

In maths this week, we have focussed on comparisons of sizes, mass and capacity through lots of practical activities. The children have listened attentively during carpet time and it was a

> pleasure to then see them apply their new learning and vocabulary when working independently in independent learning play sessions. A large teddy and small teddy made comparisons of sizes and amounts at their teddy bears' picnic. The language evolved from 'Daddy Bear' to big or large bear. The children's mathematical vocabulary has blossomed throughout the week!

You may have heard about the PTA Christmas cards. This week, the children have been creating their designs. This is an activity that we like to complete in school so rest assured your child's masterpiece will soon be shared with you.

> Each week, our Reception children will be learning a new poem. This activity is designed to support the development of speech and language skills. We hope you enjoyed our video of 'Things I can do' last week, on Tapestry. Watch out for 'Down is the Earth' this week.

We are delighted that your child's Tapestry account is now up and running. All adults are enjoying uploading observations and photos of activities at school. # Key Stage 1 (Years 1 & 2)

It's been a busy week in Key Stage 1. We have enjoyed some late sunshine but our children have really been the shining lights this week! In English this week, the children used what they had learned last week about Colourful Semantics to

write some super stories about the Gruffalo. They included the different elements of a sentence to compose and rehearse what they were going to say before writing, using the coloured cards to help them. They created some amazing writing and really impressed us all! In maths, we have been learning about place value and the way our number system works. We have done lots of work using objects to represent the tens and ones digits in a number. We have built them and described them to get a secure understanding of what each digit means and what numbers look like when they are represented by real objects.

In science, we are learning about animals and animal classification. We started by learning about some of the groups of animals (e.g. mammals, reptiles, birds and fish) and what features they have in common to make them classified in that way. We then looked at the similarities and differences between animals within those



groups and described these, using scientific language. In our geography lessons, we have been venturing into the wider world and expanding our understanding of the world around us. We started by thinking about our local area but then ventured further afield, thinking about other places we have been and using the computer to explore some of them virtually.

We have been loving our music lessons so far, too! The Year 2s have begun working with Mrs Freitas on a Friday morning, learning to play the recorder. They have started to learn how to hold their recorder and the positions in which to put their fingers. Whilst the Year 2s have begun their recorder lessons, the Year 1s have been enjoying doing music with Mr Merrall and Mrs Atkinson. We have been focussing on the musical element of pulse: that steady beat that makes you tap your foot or nod your head in time with the music. We have started by learning to sing a song called "Hey, You!" which has a strong pulse.

Well done Key Stage 1. You have all worked extremely hard and we are proud of the effort you are making.


# Lower Key Stage 2 (Years 3 & 4)

The autumn half-term is now in full swing and it has been another busy and exciting week in Lower Juniors.



All the children were excited about starting their new class novel: Boot- Small Robot, Big Adventure by Shane Hegarty. Poor Boot had woken up in a scrapyard, Krush 'em Kwik', with a cracked screen and only two and half memories and was surrounded by lots of other pieces of discarded 'metal rubbish'. He does remember having an owner called Beth and he is sure that she never meant to lose him but how is he ever going to find her? In Chapter 3, he encounters a human called Flint, who works at Krush 'em Kwik, and quickly finds himself in danger as tearing Robots apart is Flint's favourite part of his job. Curling into a tight ball,

Boot desperately rolled himself across the scrapyard and through a gap in the fence which lead him onto a quiet road outside. We left Boot running up the road not really knowing where he was going but with an unwavering determination to find a way home to Beth!



In science this half term, the children are enjoying learning about 'States of Matter.' Having compared and grouped different materials together according to whether they are solids, liquids or gases, this week the children were given the task of recognising and grouping the individual properties that each of these states of matter have. On the playground, to help clarify

their understanding, the children had lots of fun acting out how particles are organised and behave differently in solids, liquids and gases and then were able to verbally describe the differences to each other back in the classroom. Following this, the children were able to identify key material properties such as a solid being able to keep its shape or liquid taking the shape of the container it's poured into. Next week, the children will be carrying out their own practical investigation to try and find out whether a gas actually weighs anything or not!

In PSHE this week, all three classes took part in special, virtual assembly hosted by the NSPCC charity. The theme of the assembly was 'Speak out, Stay Safe.' We talked about the different types of worries children could potentially be carrying around with them each day and how these can affect them both physically and mentally. We also maturely discussed different types of abuse that some children



could encounter including physical, emotional, sexual, bullying, and online, cyber bullying and how to recognise when this may be happening. The children clearly understood that abuse is never their fault and that abuse is not ok. Children knew who they could talk to, both at home and at school, if they were ever worried about any of the issues raised and they could identify their safe adults and how a safe adult would make them feel every single day. Finally, we identified another source of help and support for all children in the form of Childline and we learnt their phone number (0800 1111) off by heart.



### <u>Upper Key Stage 2 (Years 5 & 6)</u>

As part of our music curriculum, Class 9 and 10 have been working with Ms Freitas to learn to play the clarinet. In our first session, we were taught how to assemble our clarinet, including being shown



how to secure the reed. This week, we learnt about some of the finger positions that were required to create basic notes. To our surprise, it took us more than a couple of attempts of blowing through the reed to create the desired sound. At times, some of us puffed up our cheeks, 'a bit like hamsters', and had to correct the way we were blowing.




In science this term, we will be learning about 'Inheritance and Evolution'. In this week's lesson, we were taught about inheritance and learnt that the traits of parents can be passed on to their offspring (inherited) whereas other traits are acquired (learnt). We were introduced to the concept of DNA and genes; we began to understand that these contained the instructions required to build all living things. We now understand that offspring inherit genes from their parents which dictate their characteristics: eye colour, the ability to roll your tongue and hair colour,

amongst other things. Using images of different people, we were able to draw what we thought their offspring might look like, based on their physical features.

We have started our historical study, 'Invaders and Settlers', with a particular focus on the

Vikings. As part of our initial lessons, we recapped our existing knowledge of British history before learning about the Anglo Saxons prior to the Viking invasion. We explored the social structure, village life and the roles of different members of the community. In addition, we learnt about the importance of farming and the various crafts and trades that were essential to their society. We then learnt about the structure of the seven kingdoms, which would later become Britain.

As part of our RE topic this term, we welcomed in Ian from Humanist UK to discuss Humanism. He spoke to each of our classes and taught us about their core beliefs and values. To our surprise, we discovered that Humanists also celebrate important moments in their lives, such as naming days, getting married and funerals. We had chance to ask Ian some questions and discussed some of his beliefs and our ideas.
