Acting Headteacher's Message

Learning About the Rule of Law

This week's Monday assembly was led by Matt Messias, who focused his assembly on our current big question: "Do I have to?" This question formed the starting point for a rich exploration of the Rule of Law, one of our important British values.

Matt began by talking about British values and what they mean for us as a school community. Children learned that these values help guide our choices, support how we treat one another and create a safe and fair environment for everyone.





The assembly then explored what laws actually are. Children discussed how laws are like the rules we follow in school or at home: they help keep us safe, make sure everyone is treated fairly and allow communities to run smoothly. Matt helped us think about why laws exist and how they help people live well together. Next, children were asked to imagine what life would be like if there were no rules at all. This led to lots of lively ideas, from chaotic

classrooms to unsafe situations, helping everyone realise how important shared expectations are. Matt also talked with children about the rules we already follow at school and at home, and why these matter. Children recognised how these rules support learning, help friendships flourish and create a calm environment. One of the highlights was when Matt invited children to suggest a new rule they would introduce. There were some thoughtful and creative ideas, many centred on kindness, fairness and making sure everyone feels happy and included.

The assembly ended with the reminder that rules aim to make everyone happy, and that following them is a way we can all contribute to a positive and caring school community.

- Zigzag lines outside of schools


Parking services can issue a parking ticket (penalty charge notice, or PCN) - a parking fine - for each of these offences.

Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS)



This week, we have continued to explore our theme, 'Let's celebrate'. The children have shared their own experiences of how birthdays are celebrated in your families (thank you for sharing these on Tapestry) and learnt about how birthdays are celebrated differently around the world. As part of our birthday theme, the children have had opportunities to hold role play birthday parties, write a list of items they

need for a birthday party, create their own birthday cards and made playdough birthday cakes. We have also heard many children enjoying singing 'Happy Birthday' to each other!

In **phonics**, we enjoy hearing the question, "Are we learning a new phoneme today?" The children's continued enthusiasm for learning early reading skills is fantastic! This week, the teaching focus has been the phonemes **z**, **zz**, **qu and ch**. We have also learnt how to add **s** to the end of a word to change it from singular to plural, for example **cat-cats**, **hat-hats**. The children are also doing very well at learning 'tricky words'. These are words which cannot be read by sounding them out and can be practised at home on their tricky word cards. Hopefully, children are beginning to point out these tricky words to you.

In **maths** this week, the children have learnt about four sided shapes. This has included learning about squares and rectangles and their properties. For example, a square has four sides which are the same length and four corners. The children have thoroughly enjoyed being creative in

their maths work, making four sided shapes out of construction equipment and printing squares and rectangles with Duplo bricks.





This week, you have received a letter (in book bags) regarding our nativity roles and detailing costume suggestions. Please do speak to us if you would like any help with finding a costume.

Key Stage 1 (Years 1 & 2)

Wow, what an amazing job our Key Stage 1 children have done this week! They have been given plenty of chances to shine like the stars that they are and have met every independent challenge with maturity and determination. We have all been so proud of their efforts!

This week, we have been comparing the North and South Poles in geography. We compared the temperatures and wildlife and sorted facts according to

which location they belonged to. We also recapped what we knew about the wildlife of the Arctic and Antarctica.

In English, we have been writing non-chronological reports about penguins. We used what we had learned in last week's work about the features of non-chronological reports, such as subheadings and related facts, technical vocabulary, and 3rd person pronouns. We used these to organise our content and

write about what they eat, how they survive and how they care for their young. We wrote some fascinating reports and even the weather joined in to inspire us with some snow!



It was so wonderful to watch Class 3 perform their class assembly on Friday afternoon. They did an amazing job of showcasing all the fantastic learning they have done in the first half term. It may have only been 8 weeks but there was music, dancing, movement, art, storytelling, singing and maths on display. The assembly started with a game of compass points and then the Year 2s played a song for us on the recorder that they had been learning with Mrs

Freitas. The Year 1s played the glockenspiels and there was a chance for the children top dazzle us with their maths skills. They did an amazing job and we were so proud of them. Thank you to everyone who helped the children to learn their lines, practise them and be so confident with speaking. Well done, Class 3!



From one performance to another, the children have started to work on this year's nativity. We have started to learn the songs so don't be surprised to hear some of them being sung at home. The children have also been assigned parts for the play and these will have been sent home with the children, so please check their bags and homework folders. The children have engaged really well so far and are already excited to put on an amazing show.

Lower Key Stage 2 (Years 3 & 4)



In science this week, the classroom was buzzing with curiosity! As part of our 'Animals Including Humans' topic, the children became young dental experts while learning all about teeth. They began by exploring large tooth models and discovered that we have four different types including incisors, canines, premolars and molars and they each have their own special job


when we chew food. The children then used mirrors and dental mirrors to look inside their own mouths and identify where each type of tooth is located. There was lots of excitement as the children realised they have a mixture of both adult and baby teeth! Afterwards, the children got creative by using red and white plasticine to make their very own tooth models. They carefully shaped and positioned each type of tooth, showing fantastic attention to detail.





This week in computing, the children have been learning how to use 2Email. To begin with, they explored how to locate their emails and check for new messages using both the alert icon and the inbox within the 2Email app. They then learnt how to craft the perfect reply, experimenting with font styles, sizes, colours and even adding emoticons to bring their messages to life. Alongside this, we focused on the very important skill of staying safe online, including how to report an email to a teacher if something in a message they received concerned them.

Afterwards, the classroom buzzed with laughter as the children searched their address books for recipients in the class to send their favourite jokes to.



This half term, our budding artists have stepped into the colourful world of pointillism. We kicked things off with an artist study on the Georges Seurat, discovering how he revolutionised painting by creating images using tiny dots of colour. The children were amazed to learn that his ground breaking masterpiece, A Sunday Afternoon on the Island of La Grande Jatte, was the very first major artwork created in this style. They

Upper Key Stage 2 (Years 5 & 6)



As part of our RE lessons, we have been investigating different places of worship. This week, we compared the way Hindus worship at home to the way they worship at the mandir (their place of worship). We identified similarities and differences, recognising, for example, that both at home and in their place of worship, Hindus would have murtis (statues); these represent different deities which collectively are all part of Brahma but they would sometimes differ in size and decoration.

The Year 6 pupils welcomed Matt back, who is working with them to guide them in how to be resilient and develop a positive growth mindset. This experience will be valuable as the year progresses and we move towards secondary school. We have additional sessions planned which we hope will support the year group with their learning over the coming months and later life.





This week we have learned about the harsh lives of child chimney sweeps during the Industrial Revolution. Many were extremely young and came from families who could not afford to keep them at home. Their small size meant they were forced to climb narrow chimneys to scrape away soot from coal fires. The work was exhausting and dangerous. Chimneys were cramped and filled with dust that made it hard to breathe, and children often suffered injuries or long-term health problems. Over time new laws were introduced to protect children, and the job eventually disappeared.

Learning about their experiences helps us appreciate how much working conditions have improved.

Well done to everyone in Year 5 and 6 for working so hard during our assessment week where the information we gather informs teachers' planning to enable us to support each child's future learning.










Festive Family Fun
