Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS)

This week has been a busy week in Reception. We have focussed our learning about special times which are being observed and celebrated this week and month. We have also enjoyed learning about autumn through a range of activities too.

On Monday, the children learnt about celebrating Diwali (following recent celebrations around the world). They enjoyed learning the story of Rama and Sita, finding out how Hindus and Sikhs celebrate this special celebration, creating rangoli patterns in the playground and making diwa lamps.





On Tuesday, we were grateful to be visited by Mrs Broom who talked to the children about her role with the ambulance service. This continued our theme of people who help us. The children really enjoyed hearing all about how Mrs Broom helps other people.

This week, the children have enjoyed exploring Black History through stories. Our focus story 'Look Up' by Nathan Bryon is a wonderful story all about career aspirations and space travel featuring the science-mad main character, Rocket, she's going to be the greatest astronaut, star-catcher, space-traveller that has ever lived!





The children have also completed a range of autumn themed activities including, making a playdough hedgehog, collecting leaves to make leaf people and finding autumn themed tricky words in the outdoor classroom.

Our visit to **Harlow Carr** on Thursday was fantastic. The children thoroughly enjoyed everything from the coach journey to the brilliant workshop led by the RHS staff. We looked for signs of autumn by investigating leaves, seeds and colours in the gardens. The children also had great fun pretending to be different shaped leaves! There was also an opportunity to look at the amazing gardens and spot signs of autumn as we



walked around. We all had a fantastic day, even though we did get a little bit wet and the adults who supported us commented that the children had been an absolute credit to the school. We are very proud of them all.

We are amazed at how well all the children have settled into their first term at school and very proud of the progress they are making in many areas of the curriculum already.

Key Stage 1 (Years 1 & 2)

It has been an extremely long half term to start the year but we have made it! We are so proud of the resilience of our children to keep going with enthusiasm and to continue to work so hard over the last 8 weeks. This week, we worked very hard to write our own independent stories, based on the book "Lost and Found". We have already enjoyed the story and seen how




it could be adapted by changing the central characters. This week, we came up with our own stories about lost monkeys, polar bear cubs and meerkats that turned up on doorsteps and were returned to their natural habitats. The children used familiar plots and themes to inspire their writing as they showcased their very best independent work. They worked extremely hard and wowed us with the quality and beauty of their writing. Well done Key Stage 1: we were seriously impressed!



In maths, we have been applying what we know about addition to solve addition word problems. This involved us reading and understanding a puzzle and extrapolating a calculation, based on the numbers and words in the problem. We then had to apply the skills, knowledge and methods we had learned previous, in order to solve the calculation.

Once we had done, we were able to answer the question in context. There was a lot for us to think about but we rose to the challenge and applied our addition methods accurately.

Our art this week was linked to the work we have been doing in science on living things and their habitats. We were looking at patterns and beauty in nature and using what we had seen to inspire our own artwork. We were fascinated by looking at the beauty and intricacy of spider webs. We learned how to draw them ourselves by starting with a large star shape and then connecting the lines, radiating outwards. After we had drawn the framework, we used shading techniques to enhance and personalise our piece. We also looked at the line patterns in leaves and did rubbings of real leaves in our sketch books, using wax crayons. We layered our leaf shapes and used a variety of colours to create bright, vibrant pieces that looked simply stunning.



Well done Key Stage 1. We hope that you enjoy a very well-earned break and look forward to seeing you in November!

Lower Key Stage 2 (Years 3 & 4)


Well done, Year 3 and 4! We are all incredibly proud of the hard work and enthusiasm you've shown towards your learning during this half term.

There have been many highlights this half term but our "All Wrapped Up" Ancient Egyptian topic has certainly been one to remember! The variety of practical activities and the amazing facts we've discovered so far have made this topic truly stand out and memorable.



This week, the children were challenged to construct their own pyramids using sugar cubes - with no instructions! Through plenty of trial and error, teamwork, perseverance and by applying their knowledge of pyramid structures, they created some truly impressive models. It really wasn't as easy as they thought it was going to be.

After designing and creating a sequence of actions last week, the children made their own Shadufs this week. They carefully measured and cut dowel to the correct lengths, following safety instructions brilliantly while using saws. The biggest challenge was assembling the three dowel pieces to form a sturdy tripod.






Reminder for Class 6 parents / carers

November in the school hall.



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Upper Key Stage 2 (Years 5 & 6)



In history, we have been learning about Black History Month and focusing on the remarkable life and achievements of Nelson Mandela. Using key vocabulary such as equality, justice, freedom and perseverance, we explored how Mandela dedicated his life to fighting against apartheid in South Africa and worked tirelessly to bring people together in peace. We learned about the challenges he faced during his 27 years in prison and how his courage and determination helped to end racial segregation. We also discussed the importance of his legacy today, reflecting on how his message of hope, forgiveness and unity continues to inspire people around the world to stand up for what is right and fair.

In French this term, we have learnt the necessary vocabulary related to what we eat for lunch, healthy diets and whether these foods have masculine or feminine determiners. We have started to have a conversation with our peers about our own lunch, discussing whether this was healthy or not. We then looked at how to order a variety of foods in a French café setting.





In PE this week, we have been developing and consolidating our gymnastic skills on the floor, through partner work and on large apparatus. We focused on building control, strength and teamwork as we created a sequenced routine to share with our peers. We worked hard to balance with control, keeping our eyes focused on a fixed point to help us stay steady with minimum wobble. When performing balances with our partner, we made sure both of us were fully involved and contributing equally to the position. We concentrated on holding each balance for at least three seconds, keeping our whole body tight and

extended. When supporting on our back, we remembered to keep our stomach engaged and our back flat to help my partner stay stable. By linking our actions smoothly and expressing our own ideas, we were able to create a sequence that flowed well and engaged our audience.
