# Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS)

We have been delighted to hear about all the wonderful activities which you did during the Easter holidays. Thank you also for uploading some of these to Tapestry so we can see and comment on these. Please feel free to continue to add posts about your child's activities outside of school.

> This week, we have started a new topic 'In the Garden'. The children will be exploring how plants grow, learning about animal life cycles and finding out who lives in the garden. We look forward to sharing our learning with you, throughout this topic.

Our new topic began this week by learning about the life cycle of a bean. The children enjoyed reading the story of 'Jack and the Beanstalk'. Then they planted their own bean. We hope they grow!

In **literacy**, the children have been very keen to practise their writing in our phonics and handwriting sessions, this week. In every phonics session, we practise writing words which either use the same phonemes learnt or the same phonic spelling patterns. For example, this week, we have begun learning how to blend adjacent consonants together and writing words with these, including **best**, lift and jump.

In **maths** this week, we have begun to understand numbers beyond 10. The children have started to create numbers using the Numicon pieces that represent each number. To make 12, they learnt to use a 10 and a 2 etc. We are also beginning to count larger numbers from 10, for example, starting at 10 and moving up in 1s. We shall also continue to revisit number bonds to 10 at the start of each maths lesson.

> We are very proud of Class 2 this week. Their class assembly was brilliant and we're sure that (if you were able to come) you enjoyed it too! The children worked very hard and really loved presenting their assembly to you.

# **PE Days**

This half term, children will need their PE kits on a **Thursday**. As the weather begins to get warmer, we may go outside for PE lessons. Therefore, children may wish to wear trainers and have a jumper in case they feel cold. Thank you.

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# Key Stage 1 (Years 1 & 2)

Welcome back to school everyone! It has been so lovely to see all the children back. We have made a great start to the new term with lots of exciting learning. We have enjoyed hearing about all of the wonderful things that the children got up to in the Easter break and we spent the week writing recounts about it. After learning about the features (including past tense verbs and first



person perspective), we planned our writing by thinking in detail about what we had enjoyed doing. We then wrote at length about all the wonderful Recounts things that we had been doing, using the features we had discussed. It was wonderful to read about the amazing time the children had had. Their enthusiasm shone through!

With the changing seasons, we have been learning about plants. We were fascinated to learn about how different plants grow and bloom at different times of the year, depending on its variety and needs. We learned about how plants can either grow from seeds or bulbs but that they all need the same things to survive: nutrients, water and sunlight. After looking at some common



examples of garden plants and wild plants, we went on a plant hunt around the school grounds. Using a classification sheet, we identified the name of the plants we saw and classified them as either being garden plants or wild plants. We loved going out to see science in nature.

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In computing, we started learning about spreadsheets. We learned what spreadsheets are and that they can be used to organise and store information. We investigated the features, learning about how the information is stored in cells, which are then organised into rows and columns. We entered simple information into a spreadsheet, such as numbers and text, saved our work and then entered

mathematical operations to make a calculator, using simple formulae. It was fascinating to see that, by changing the numbers in a cell, the computer would automatically update the answers of the calculations.

Well done everyone! It was lovely to see you all back and we are proud of the great start you made to the summer term.

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#### Lower Key Stage 2 (Years 3 & 4)

It was lovely to welcome all the children back into school after the Easter break. They have settled into the routines again quickly and are looking forward to learning lots of new and exciting things this term.

During our history lesson this week, the children looked at the Roman army and uncovered why they were so successful in battle. They discovered lots of interesting facts about how the army developed over time and that as they began to fight further away from home, it became a full time job for the soldiers. The children then looked at the different equipment soldiers used and how they dressed for battle, along with the

different activities they did during their training. To consolidate their learning, in the playground, all the children then all had a go at the different formations the Romans used during battle. These included the turtle, the wedge, the repel cavalry and the orb which were all ways of attacking and defending themselves against their enemies.

In P.E. this half-term, all three lower junior classes are fortunate enough to have one of our P.E. specialists, Mr Walton, teaching us tennis skills. This week, the focus was on racket skills. Firstly, they practised moving around with a tennis ball balanced on the racket strings and then they had to move around bouncing the tennis ball in the

centre of the racket, keeping it under control at all times. Finally, in pairs, the children practised hitting the ball to each other without it bouncing. They carefully counted how many shots they managed within their rally before the ball hit the ground. There were some impressive scores!

> All three class have started their new class novel this week, 'The Firework-Makers Daughter' by Philip Pullman. The children were immediately hooked with the story about the firework-maker Lalchand and his daughter Lila who doesn't just want to be a firework-maker's daughter but a skilled firework maker herself. To do so though, Lila still needs to learn a lot and face massive challenges to get through her apprenticeship. The children can't wait to continue reading and see where Lila takes us on her adventure to become a skilled firework maker.



## Upper Key Stage 2 (Years 5 & 6)

We have welcomed back all our children and hope that you all had a lovely Easter.



This week, the Year 5s started our history unit on the Mayans. We learnt that Mayans once live in Mesoamerica, an area that is made up of Mexico and part of central America. In addition to locating where in the world they lived, we also discovered what was special about the ancient Mayan civilization. We were taught that they created their own alphabet, established a complex political system and built impressive temples, palaces and monuments.

This week, the second half of the Year 5s had their Bikeability sessions. We were taught how to make sure our bikes were road worthy and check our helmets to make sure they were free from cracks. In the morning, we spent time practising riding our bikes on the playground. It was important that we were confident stopping, maneuvering around obstacles and avoiding colliding into one another. In the afternoon and on Friday, we rode our bikes around



the local area. We were taught how to navigate the roads safely and to take into consideration other traffic and pedestrians.



In maths this week, the children in Mr Tod and Mr Bennett's maths groups learnt about ratio and proportion. We began by discussing ratios, making links to fractions, multiplication and division. Once confident, we worked through a variety of ratio and proportion problems which were set in real-life contexts. In Mrs Fitzpatrick and

Mr Carpenter's group, we have been rounding decimals to two decimal places and have started to solve problems that involve adding and subtracting decimals.
