If your child **cannot** have the Nasal spray, the injectable flu vaccine is available, and you will be able to choose that method on the consent form.


If you **DO NOT** wish for your child to have a flu vaccination, please complete a **NO** consent via the same link.

Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS)



In **phonics**, we learnt four new phonemes this week; g, o, c, and k. Many of the children are beginning to hear the blends in simple words such as 's -a - t'. It has been a pleasure to watch the children delight in their own progress with reading. Before long they'll be reading their bedtime story to you instead!

This week, we have learnt about and met people in our school who have different jobs. The children enjoyed walking around school and talking to the adults about their jobs and visiting where they work. They learnt that many adults have lots of different jobs during the day!





In **maths**, this week, we have explored numbers to three. This is something we will do in great detail over the coming weeks – you would be surprised at the depth these three numbers can be explored. We will represent the numbers

in many different ways, combine the numbers and write the numbers, all in fun and practical ways. This is something the children could share with you at home. How many different ways can you spot 1, 2 and 3 in your home?



The children have started their reading lessons, this week. They have begun by reading wordless books. This teaches the children the reading practice session routines and also promotes a rich use of language and vocabulary to tell the story independently, by using the pictures. When sharing this book at home, please encourage discussion about the pictures and also prompt

children to locate the small pictures within the large picture. These will be a good place to begin discussions. **Please return all books on Mondays each week please.**

On Thursday 3rd October or Friday 4th October, we would like to invite you to stay and play with the children between 9 – 9.45am. This is an opportunity for the children to show you around their classroom and enjoy sharing their favourite activities. In the morning, please drop your children off as usual so



they can become settled into their usual routines. We will then ask you to sign in for safety purposes before joining your child in the classroom. We greatly appreciate you choosing one day to visit your children, to avoid our classrooms becoming overcrowded. We look forward to seeing you.

Key Stage 1 (Years 1 & 2)




It has been another really busy week in Key Stage 1. The children are all working hard and we are very proud of the effort they are making. In English this week, we were learning about description using the story The Gruffalo. We started by learning what an adjective is and how we can use them to help a reader imagine things more clearly. We collected adjectives to describe the Gruffalo and the woods and then wrote a character description and a setting

description. What a lot of interesting details we all came up with!

In maths, we have continued to develop our secure understanding of place value and numbers. We have been representing numbers practically but have also used diagrams to represent the digits in a number.

We have also been learning about shapes, particularly the difference between 2D and 3D shapes and the names of common 3D solids. We learnt that a cube has square faces but is not a square itself.



As part of our science topic looking at animals, we have been comparing and grouping the animals. This week, we were describing the diets of different animals, using the vocabulary "carnivore, herbivore or omnivore" to group them according to whether they ate meat, plants or both. We then compared the diets of different

animals and sorted them practically in a Venn diagram working collaboratively with our friends. We were so impressed by the discussion between the children as they supported each other with this grouping activity.

After learning about our local area and places further afield in the UK, this week we went to a very distant place in geography and compared our country to Australia! We didn't actually go there, of course, but we explored Australia using the computer and by watching videos. After this, we compared the two locations to look for similarities.



Well done Key Stage 1. It has been another excellent week. Keep up the good work!

Lower Key Stage 2 (Years 3 & 4)

Year 3 and 4 have continued to show wonderful enthusiasm for our topics this half term.

This term, our history topic is from 'Flint to Iron' (Stone Age to Iron Age). So far, the children have looked at a timeline of the main events during the prehistoric period and have learnt that the Stone Age is split into three distinctive periods; Palaeolithic period (Old Stone Age), Mesolithic Period (Middle Stone Age) and Neolithic period (New Stone Age).

During these prehistoric times, dwellings changed drastically. This week, the children used secondary sources of information and discovered that people during the Old Stone Age were nomads, but over time they began to build homes and started to settle. By the Iron Age, people were building large roundhouses that housed many people as well as cattle, and they lived in large settlements on high ground called hillforts.

In computing, the children have been focusing on online safety. To begin, the children encountered an email simulation through Purple Mash. In this simulation, the children received an email from an email address that was unknown to them that contained an attachment. The children discussed whether they thought it was safe to open the email and the attachment or whether they would report it to the teacher. Following this, they looked at the SMART



rules of staying safe online. This week, using their completed homework, the children looked at healthy screentime habits. They learnt about the positive and negative impact technology can have on health and the environment, and how they can balance screen time with other activities.



The book, The Stone Age Boy by Satoshi Kitamura continues to inspire our writing sessions this week. Last week, the children worked on identifying different word classes such as nouns, adjectives, adverbs and prepositions. They applied this to writing sentences that described the special cave Om (the cave girl) shows the boy. However, it isn't an ordinary cave; it contains fascinating cave paintings. This week, the children have focussed on writing

a number of sentences that flow to create a paragraph.

Upper Key Stage 2 (Years 5 & 6)



As part of our PE lessons, we have started working with our PE specialist, Mr Stephenson from 'Total Sports'. He will be helping us to develop our team building skills, communication and resilience over the course of this half term. This week, we have focused on working cooperatively. During our lesson, we played tag-rugby,

working collaboratively with our classmates. If we didn't communicate effectively, often, as the attacking team, we would lose possession of the ball. By coordinating with our team mates, we were able to position ourselves much more effectively whilst attacking and defending.

This term, we are learning how to navigate the internet safely and have discussed some of the dangers we need to be aware of. During our lessons, we were advised to be mindful when sharing personal details like our full name, address or phone number online; this helps to keep us and our private information safe. Just like in the real world, we were reminded that not



everyone online is who they say they are and that we should always be cautious when talking to strangers. As part of our work with the NSPCC, we also discussed cyberbullying and understood that it is important to be kind online and to report any instances of cyberbullying to a trusted adult.



In English, our focus has been on writing non-chronological reports about adaptation, which links to our science topic. Learning to write in this style teaches us to organise information clearly, formally and logically. This week, we have been taught about the features of non-chronological

reports: clear titles and subheadings, technical vocabulary, captions, tense and formal tone. We have learnt how to gather and organise information from various sources; using our notes, we wrote our own sentences which included a range of sentence openers and sentence types.


