Acting Headteacher's Message

Behaviour Management Strategies

Our school community clearly values both academic and social and emotional learning. We therefore aim to teach and support our children to become good citizens and to be able to manage and understand their emotions appropriately.

At Ralph Butterfield School, we update and provide all staff with training on our positive behavior management strategies. The behaviour management approaches, that that we use, are based on the **Pivotal Approach** and **Restorative Practices**. These are generally far more effective than punitive systems in enabling children to understand what has gone wrong and their role in a situation. The goal is for our children to have empathy for all involved, to take responsibility, and to have the tools to hopefully prevent a similar situation arising again.

The Pivotal Approach has five pillars of practice which are:

- 1. Consistent, calm adult behaviour
- 2. Lots of positive praise and reinforcement e.g. verbal / written for the child and good news shared with parents
- 3. Relentless routines and consistency
- 4. Scripting difficult interventions

We use the first three pillars as they are, and the final two pillars dovetail with the Restorative Approach.

We have three simple expectations for the whole school: **Be Ready, Be Respectful** and Be Safe. These are used in everyday conversations with the children e.g. 'Thank you for picking that up; you are showing respect for the environment'.

We use **Restorative Approaches** to help children understand and improve their behaviour, develop resilience and learn strategies for resolving problems. These help develop a happier school where the focus is on learning and not worrying about conflict.

We hope the information below will help you understand these approaches:

- Your child may be part of a *Restorative Chat* in which the resolution of conflict is dealt with in the first instance. Everyone involved has a chance to share their perspective on an incident, discuss their feelings and find a positive way forward.
- If it is felt that a child needs to reflect further on their behaviour, they may spend further time chatting with an adult at break time.
- Where a Restorative Chat is not enough, depending on what has happened, a child may be asked to attend a **Restorative Circle**. This is a meeting with everyone involved to:
 - ♦ Discuss what is happening
 - ♦ Look at who has been affected or upset
 - ♦ Decide how it can be put right
 - ♦ Find a way forward that is fair to everyone


• As a result of this, if it is found that a child has emotionally or physically harmed another, through verbal or physical actions, the child will complete a *reflection form* at lunchtime with a class teacher. Repeated incidents will be escalated to a member of the senior leadership team.

As you know, we work closely with our parents as a whole school community. At any stage in the process, a class teacher may choose to contact you. If these approaches are not working for a child and there is a persistent behaviour issue, you would be invited in to school to discuss this with a class teacher and, where necessary, a member of the senior leadership team.

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World Book Day




Thursday 6th March


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Can you help?

Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS)

Welcome back to the start of a new half-term!

We are delighted to share with you that our new theme is 'Traditional Tales'. The children's learning will be centred on many different traditional and favourite stories. This week has been 'Goldilocks and The Three Bears'



week. We have begun our Traditional Tales journey by building beds for the bears out of Lego, using junk modelling to create models of the three bears, acting out the story and writing a letter from Goldilocks to apologise for her behaviour.



We have also enjoyed reading 'The Ghanaian Goldilocks' story too. The children learnt about and made their own Kente cloth which is a beautifully patterned material from Ghana.

This half-term, our **phonics** lessons will consolidate the digraphs and trigraphs already taught. The children will have opportunity to practise reading words which contain these phonemes (sounds) and also revise the tricky words taught so far. Please see the homework activities, to consolidate weekly learning. It is fantastic to see the progress which all children are making with their phonics knowledge and to see how they put this into action while reading and writing.



In **maths** this week, we have started to learn about the numbers 9 and 10. The children have explored different representations of these numbers and also practised writing them. They also practised repeating patterns while making the whole class Kente cloth.

We would love to see everyone enjoying listening to, acting out and reading their favourite traditional tale. If your child enjoys doing this at home, please upload a photo/video to Tapestry so we can share their love of stories.

Key Stage 1 (Years 1 & 2)

It has been so lovely to welcome everyone back to school after a well-deserved week off and to hear about all the exciting things that people have got up to whilst they have not been at school.

In science this week, we have been looking at seasonal changes. It is exciting to see that, as we head into spring, there are signs all around that the weather is changing and that it is affecting nature. We learned about how plants adapt and change with the season, in terms of bulbs sprouting and buds forming before growing into leaves. We also looked at the reasons why animals change their behaviours: ending hibernation; migrating to




different lands or by creating new life. We looked at other changes too, including the length of daylight hours and the changes in the clothes we wear and activities we do. We recorded our observations as part of a long-term investigation that has been happening throughout the year. When it is finished, we will be able to make many comparisons throughout the entire seasonal cycle.



We have loved getting creative this week in art. We learned about printing and how it replicates a single design many, many times. We had a wonderful, hands-on exploration session, in which we had a go at plying objects with paint and then pressing them onto paper to see what patterns they made. We could see how the raised parts of the objects collected the paint as this was what we could see on the paper. We will later use this knowledge to create a stamp, which we can then use to make a repeating printed pattern of our own.

We have loved our lessons with our P.E specialist, Mr Walton, who will be working with us this half term. We have been having lots of fun developing ball skills. This week, we were doing team relays, using a variety of techniques to pass the ball between team mates, including bounce passes and chest passes. We had to communicate clearly, show good awareness and good control, especially since we had to start again whenever we dropped the ball! However, we were super stars and rose to the challenge, feeling very proud of ourselves when we succeeded together.

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Lower Key Stage 2 (Years 3 & 4)

Year 3 and 4 have had a lovely start to the half term!



This week, the children began their new French topic 'Vive le sport' (our sporting lives). To begin with, they have learnt new vocabulary for healthy and unhealthy food and some drinks. The children then learnt how to say which foods and drinks they liked and disliked.

Afterwards, they worked with a partner stating in French whether the items of food and drink they liked were unhealthy (C'est mauvais pour la santé) or healthy (C'est bon pour la santé).





Our RE topic this half term is 'Why are festivals important to religious communities?' As an introduction to the topic, the children thought about the question 'What is worth celebrating?' They looked at a variety of pictures of different aspects of celebrations, including traditional items, religious items, decorations, gifts and cards. Afterwards, they discussed and listed the celebrations that they have

attended or they know others celebrate. For example, birthday parties, weddings, bonfire night, wedding anniversaries, naming ceremonies, Christmas, Easter, Diwali, Hanukkah and christenings. The children then looked at the list of celebrations and decided whether or not these celebrations were religious or not and identified some reasons why people celebrate. For example, some celebrations remind people of their beliefs and values, others help you to remember stories and some people celebrate events to be able to share experiences with others and spend time together.

Our Pantastic rehearsals have continued this week and the children are doing brilliantly at remembering the stage directions and are starting to feel more confident with their lines. If you haven't already sent your child's costume into school, please do so as soon as possible before Friday 7th March. Please ensure that all items are named, including the bag. If you are having difficulty sourcing any part of the requested costume, please speak to your child's class teacher and we will happily help.

Upper Key Stage 2 (Years 5 & 6)

We hope you had a restful half term. The children have come back refreshed and ready for their learning.

This week in English, the Year 6s completed a persuasive leaflet advertising Robinwood for Year 5 pupils. Year 5 children wrote persuasively to advertise Seaworld, which is a theme park in Florida. All children were encouraged to use both literary and punctuation techniques taught since September within their leaflets to engage the reader.



In PSHE this week, we learnt about communicating responsibly online (online safety). We discussed all of the different ways we communicate, and the array of devices and apps that we use. We thought about how, when we are communicating with others, we must be respectful. This can be difficult when we are communicating online because with some online communication methods, you cannot see facial expressions or hear someone's tone of voice. Therefore, words can be misinterpreted very easily. We also highlighted ways to keep ourselves safe online by not sharing personal information.


