Raise York (Family Hub Network) are offering drop-ins which are free, run throughout the summer and are suitable for under-fives and primary aged children. The full range of events <u>can be found online</u>, or you can email yorkeducation@york.gov.uk for a copy of the calendar of events.

Additionally, York have bought into the 'Solihull Approach' for families which has a fantastic range of free, online courses for parents/carers and grandparents. These can be accessed on the website solihullapproachparenting.com. The access code that you will need to enter to access the courses for free is Raise. There are so many helpful courses around such as sleep issues, supporting transition and a change of school, understanding children's/teenager's feelings, understanding additional needs, to name but a few. The Solihull approach is 'for the emotional health and wellbeing for all children and their parents so that they can thrive as kind, sociable and emotionally aware people throughout their lives. inourplace online courses are developed by psychologists at the Solihull Approach in partnership with health experts, schools and psychotherapists as well as parents.' 

Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS)

This week, our dinosaur topic has explored the size of dinosaurs. We have related this to how long our classroom and playground are and the height of a person. We discovered that the Spinosaurus was the largest carnivorous dinosaur and the Brachiosaurus was the largest herbivorous dinosaur. The children were also



interested to learn that some 'dinosaurs' were actually prehistoric reptiles. This included the Plesiosaur and Pterodactyl. Scientists believe these reptiles were alive at the same time as dinosaurs so they are often classed as dinosaurs!



This week, in phonics, we have revised reading words which have the suffix endings er and est. An example of these are sprinter and softest. We have learnt that adding these endings changes the meaning of the words. Adding er changes the word from a verb to a noun, for example print – printer. Adding est changes the word into a superlative which is a word that means the most, for example soft – softest. We have also reviewed our Phase 4 learning, prior to carrying out our half-termly

assessments next week. We continue to revise and learn how to read and spell the tricky words to, into, all, are they, out, today and one.

In maths, the children have studied and enjoyed designing maps. We began the week by practising positional language: next to, above, below, opposite and behind. Then the children used their mapping skills to create their own story map based on the story 'What the ladybird heard'. On Thursday the children enjoyed going for a walk around Haxby. They ticked off landmarks on their route, for example, the ambulance station and bus stop. Then, at school, the children created their own map of the route walked and added on some places of interest. They look great!





In our RE lessons, we have continued to explore how people belong to different faiths. This week, the children learnt about the Muslim naming ceremony Aqiqah. During the ceremony, the baby has prayers whispered into their ear and money is donated to charities in the name of the baby.

On Wednesday, the children were excited (if also a little nervous) to meet their new teachers for Year 1. They all returned from their transition visits with smiles and they were able to share their feelings about what they were looking forward to next year. We shall be talking about this more over the coming weeks and there will also be another chance to visit new classes, next week.

Key Stage 1 (Years 1 & 2)

This week has been simply extraordinary in Key Stage 1. What a lot of exciting events we have packed in! The week started with our visitor, Chris, coming into school to give us a skipping workshop. It was such incredible fun having a go at various different skipping techniques and lots of the children blew us away with how confident and proficient they were. We also had a go



at some games that used the large playground skipping ropes. Chris had boundless enthusiasm for the subject and made it such great fun. The day finished with an action-packed assembly in which some of us got the chance to demonstrate our skills to the whole school. The whole experience was great fun and we all had such smiles on our faces.



That wasn't the only visitor who came to see us this week. On Thursday, we enjoyed our incredible topic experience day, in which we had TWO visitors who came to enrich our history topics. Richard set up a planetarium in the hall. It was an unbelievable experience in which we travelled through space, looked at Earth, the Moon and one of

Jupiter's moons. We experienced the Apollo 11 mission to the moon and learned about the mission to explore further than ever before. We also looked at the constellations in the night sky as they were projected in a panorama around us. Words simply cannot describe just how awe-inspiring it was to experience!

As well as that, Catherine took us back in time to 1666 to experience the Great Fire of London. She brought in lots of artefacts from the time and talked to us about the materials that were used to make them. We had a chance to handle them, draw them and identify what they were made from. We then challenged the teachers to try and identify what they were for. Not even our



resident history expert could guess them all correctly but (with a little help from Catherine), the children could! We then had a go at writing using a quill and ink, just like Samuel Pepys in his famous diary. The whole experience was incredible and engaging and we had brilliant fun taking part.



Lower Key Stage 2 (Years 3 & 4)

The Year 3 and 4 children have had a super week!

In science this week, the children looked at reflections and how light travels. The children experimented with mirrors to see how they reverse images. They then used torches and mirrors to discover that light travels in straight lines when it is reflected off a smooth surface at the same angle at which it hits the surface. They also found out that when light hits a bumpy surface it bounces off at a different angle. The children thoroughly enjoyed their investigation and drew brilliant diagrams to show how light travel and reflects.



All three classes took part in a skipping session with the skipping instructor Chris. They learnt four mains skipping skills. Before learning the first skill, the children learnt how best to hold the skipping the rope; handles held out straight by their arms and not by their ears. The first skill involved jumping over the rope with their feet kept together.

they did multiple jumps between each skip; first keeping their feet together and then apart. Lastly, two adults held the end of the skipping rope, and whilst it was moving around, the children needed to run into it, jump and then run out.

During PSHE, the children talked about how it feels when planned and unexpected changes happen. They discussed the various changes they have had to cope and adapt to throughout their life so far and how these changes made them feel both emotionally and physically. Following this, the children shared what concerns or worries they had about transition to their new class. They then discussed strategies they can use to help them when they are facing changes.

Upper Key Stage 2 (Years 5 & 6)

Our teachers told us about themselves and we had the opportunity to share information about ourselves. The teachers spoke about expectations and how routines may look

We have had some fantastic feedback from the new Year 7s and their day out to their various secondary schools. They talked excitedly about the lessons they had undertaken and the new friends they had made.

As part of our PE this week, we took part in a series of skipping activities. We developed our coordination and balance and learnt a variety of skipping tecniques: single jump skips, double jump skips, hopping, crossing arms and skipping over a rope being swung by adults.



After a short practise, we were able to compete in different teams with the winner being the team that made the fewest mistakes.
