Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS)

Our focus this week has been 'minibeast that live on the ground'. One of our favourite themed stories has been Snail Trail! This story has led the children to practise positional language, such as, under, over, next to, between and through. In our literacy, the children used their grapheme knowledge to write descriptions of where the snail went in the story.



During the week, the children have had varied opportunities to learn about snails and slugs. These have included snail shaped addition to five with Numicon, rolling playdough to create snails, cutting snail spirals, exploring garden habitats and learning about the mucus which some minibeast use to help them move.



Continuing to focus on snails, we have also explored the later work of the artist Henri Matisse. He used paper and scissors to create his paper collage pictures. The children used their scissor and design skills to create their own Matisse style snail pictures. These look amazing!

In phonics, we have learnt new spelling patterns including adding a suffix onto the end of a root word. For example, **twisting** and **helped**. (*Root word =twist/Suffix=ing*). When learning to read words with these new suffix endings, as always, we have discussed how we use the words and their meanings. New tricky words learnt this week are, **out** and **today**. We have also continued to practise the tricky words which we have learnt throughout the year. Please ask if you have any questions about the phonics learning which the children are currently covering.

In maths, we have continued to focus on subtraction number sentences. To calculate these, the children have used tens frames and number stories. We were very impressed that the children are able to now tell the subtraction story themselves using the language, first, then and now. Maybe the children could continue your subtracting activities with their toys at home.



Well done to Class 1 for their fabulous class assembly on Friday! Class 2 (and I'm sure all of your adults) really enjoyed it!

<u>Key Stage 1 (Years 1 & 2)</u>

This week, the children in Key Stage 1 have been working really hard. We have been enjoying learning more about space and the history of space exploration. The children were learning about the events that led up to the space race and used timelines to describe the causes and effects of the events leading up to the Apollo 11 mission. We were also using our detailed

knowledge of the mission to write information texts about the Moon landings. We planned our writing in great detail, splitting our reports into paragraphs about before, during and after the mission. After that, we wrote a section each day under the relevant subheadings for the preparation, launch, Moon landing and return to Earth. What an amazing job the children did and what fascinating, detailed texts they wrote!





There may not be life on the Moon but we were learning about the lifecycle of plants in science. We learned about how plants grow from seeds, getting bigger and stronger as they put out roots and shoots. Then new seeds form and are dispersed so that new plants can grow. We ordered the sections of the plant lifecycle. We then planned a practical investigation in which we planted our own cress seeds. We

applied our knowledge to decide on where we thought they would grow best and how to provide it with the things that it would need to grow healthily. We will observe the cress grow over time, recording what we see in cress diaries.



The Year 2s are continuing to enjoy their recorder lessons with Mrs Freitas and Mrs Reeves. They are learning new notes all the time and applying them to new songs. Recently, they have been learning to play the note C and have used it in the song "Miss Mary Mack". Year 1 have continued to do music with Mr Merrall and Mrs Atkinson and have loved the whimsical song "Just Imagine", which is about the adventures that can

be had in our imaginations. There was even an opportunity to write our own lyrics to the song!

In computing, it has been fun to learn about, and emulate, the style of well known artists. After learning about Piet Mondrian's use of bold primary colours and horizontal and vertical lines, we learned about Victorian artist William Morris' style of using repeated patterns. We created our own, using a template creator that was then applied repeatedly to make our creations.


Lower Key Stage 2 (Years 3 & 4)

It has been another fun week in Lower Key Stage 2.



The children have been very busy creating their sock puppets this week in design technology and they are coming along brilliantly. To begin with, the children have focused on creating the accessories to attach to the sock to create the character

they designed. They have been using scrap bits of material, felt, wool, beads, buttons and the other sock to their pair to make things such as ears, nostrils, hair and spikes. We can't wait to see the finished puppets.



In PSHE this week, the children have been learning to understand how to keep track of money and how to budget. They were given the challenge of creating a shopping list for a picnic for five people. They were required to purchase food for the picnic, something to carry it in and a rug to sit on. Their second challenge was to shop for a party for 20 people and where required to think about decorations, snacks

and entertainment. After they had created their shopping wish list from a selection of shop fronts that included priced items, the children had the added challenge of sticking within a set budget and had to prioritise what they bought. They did amazingly well throughout the task and we have some very clever shoppers in Lower Key Stage 2.



All three classes were instantly engrossed in their new class novel 'Friend or Foe' by Michael Morpurgo. The story is about a boy called David who is evacuated to the countryside along with other children from his school. The beginning of the story explores the different emotions that he goes through from the moment he wakes up, the emotional goodbye to Mum at the train station and through the journey. We are all eager to find out where David ends up and what becomes of his life in the countryside.


