





Headteacher's Message

Good afternoon

We have exciting plans for the relocation of a classroom! The room which is currently the Nest is going to become a KS1 classroom, and what is currently Class 3's room will become the Nest. The main beneficial reasons for this are to bring the three Year1/2 classes closer together geographically and to have the extra space for some areas of provision that support transition from Reception to Year 1. In order to ensure a timely and smooth transition with this change for September, our current Class 3 children will spend the last couple of weeks of term in this 'new' classroom. Provision is in place, as you might expect, to support any children who may find this temporary change more challenging.



Dogs

We would like to request, from dog owners, consideration of the fact that dogs should ideally not be on site. This is for various reasons, including the fact that they can be feared by other members of our school community. Thank you.

Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS)



This week, our dinosaur topic has explored carnivores, herbivores and omnivores. The children have investigated the types of teeth these dinosaurs had and how this related to the type of food they ate. The children also learnt to look at the structure of the dinosaurs to help them to determine whether they were meat or plant eaters. For example, the stegosaurus had four short stompy

feet/legs, they moved slowly and they had flat teeth; the stegosaurus was a plant eating herbivore. In a related activity, the children found dinosaurs that had been hidden around our Reception areas. They then studied them to determine if they were carnivores or herbivores and sorted them into a Venn diagram.

This week, in phonics, we have read words which have a suffix added to the end of them to change singular words into plural words. An example of this is sports, paints, frogs, boxes, scrunches and dresses. We also continue to revise and learn how to read and spell the tricky words here, little, says, by, my, like, some, come, love and do.

In Maths we have continued to practise counting to support with subtraction skills. The children have explored using their fingers, sets of objects and number lines to calculate how many were then left. We also determined that when we subtract a number the total gets smaller. This is an important mathematical concept to know.





Through our areas of provision, the children have completed a range of dinosaur related activities, practising their learning and skills. These include making a playdough dinosaur sculpture, painting a picture of a dinosaur, completing a dinosaur themed jigsaw and creating our own dinosaur stories in the small world areas. The children are using key

vocabulary during their learning, including the naming of dinosaurs



During our last visit to Haxby library this week, the children were introduced to the Summer Reading Challenge. Please do watch out for more information about this exciting activity to complete over the summer holidays.



Key Stage 1 (Years 1 & 2)


It was lovely to enjoy some summer sunshine this week, but it was the children in Key Stage 1 who really shone for us. In science we have been learning all about different animal groups (such as mammals, invertebrates, reptiles, etc.) and how scientists classify them by their characteristics. Did you



know that scientists estimate that there are around 8.7 million animal species on Earth and that 97% of them are invertebrates? After learning about the features of the main animal groups, we used classification diagrams to sort animals by answering questions about their features.

As part of our topic about significant people in history, we have been learning about two famous explorers: Neil Armstrong and Christopher Columbus. This week, we compared them both and thought about what was the same or different about their two voyages. We compared their craft, clothing and navigation equipment, as well as what they would have eaten on their respective journeys. This threw up a lot of excellent questions which we then researched on the computer. It was a great opportunity to model the skills we have been learning in computing, in relation to web pages and using a search engine (e.g Google) to efficiently search for

information. We have learned about the difference between the internet and the World Wide Web, how search engines find the information they think are the most relevant to what we type. It certainly came in useful when it came to investigating which explorer was most likely to have eaten pemmican! (It was Christopher Columbus by the way: pemmican is a mixture of dried fat, meat and berries.)



It has been a great week of P.E in Key Stage 1. We have been loving our weekly lessons with one of our P.E specialists, Mr Stephenson. We have been practising a range of skills including orienteering, in which we had to work as a team using a map to find as many different unique patterned stamps as we could. This was great for our general fitness as we covered great distances in our hunt; it was also great for our teamwork and communication skills. Don't tell them, but Mr Stephenson said that we did better at this activity than some of the UKS2



children! We also enjoyed having a practise of the activities for our sports' day, taking place on Monday, with EYFS too. At this event you should expect an amazing display of running, throwing, jumping and kicking skills. Judging by the performances in the practise, we are all in for a real treat! We hope that the weather is kind to us and that we get to see lots of you coming along to cheer on our mini-Olympians.

Well done Key Stage 1. You are already champions in our eyes!

Yorkshire Air Museum Trips

Thank you for all giving consent for your child(ren) to attend the school trip taking place on either Thursday 4th July (**Year 4**) or Thursday 11th July (**Year 3**). We are very grateful for the donations received towards this trip, including the ones which have been made over and above the suggested amount.

We have not received enough voluntary donations to cover the full cost. On this occasion, we are proceeding with the trip, but please be aware that this is at a cost to the school.

We are really looking forward to exploring World War Two artefacts and learning about evacuees, rationing, identity cards and gas masks. We will also be participating in a Paratrooper experience, being taken through the routine checks a trooper would go through before their drop and also walking around the site to look at iconic aircrafts and weaponry.

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Lower Key Stage 2 (Years 3 & 4)

On Thursday, we were lucky with the weather and had an incredibly successful Sports Day. The children thoroughly enjoyed participating in the multiple events including javelin, bean bag throw, football and hurdles. Well done to



all who participated; you all showed fantastic sportsmanship. An additional well done to Clifford who were the overall winning house at the end of the Key Stage Two Sports Day.



In PSHE, the children have continued to delve into the 9 protected Characteristics. The 9 protected characteristics mean it is against the law to discriminate against anyone because of: age, gender reassignment, being married or in a civil partnership, being pregnant or on maternity leave, disability, race including colour, nationality, ethnic or national origin, religion or belief, sex or sexual orientation. The children looked at these in the context of Pride. They learnt about what Pride is and the definitions of LGBTQ+. The children learnt that during Pride month, people come together to celebrate love, friendship and the special and unique things that make us who we are.


In science, the children have continued to learn about light and have developed their understanding of dark being the absence of light. This week, the children looked at sun safety, in particular, UV light and its impact upon humans. In addition to the impact UV light can have on the skin, the children looked at how our eyes respond to light and dark. The pupil grows bigger in the dark to allow more light to enter the eye, and gets smaller in bright light.

Rehearsals have continued this week. It is great to see so many children learning their lines so quickly.

This week, in Year 6 we have been working with Matt Messias. During the session, Matt talked about the benefits of having a positive mindset. He also gave us the opportunity to ask questions, discuss any concerns and set ourselves goals for our time in secondary school. The children were also encouraged to reflect on positive experiences during their time at Ralph Butterfield Primary School.



This week UKS2 welcomed Mark Jones who spoke to us about Buddhsim. We learnt that Buddhism arose in Ancient India, in and around the ancient Kingdom of Magadha, and that Buddhism is based on the teachings of Siddhārtha Gautama (a Hindu Prince). Mark also told us about his own day to day life as a Buddhist. He talked about meditation and the positive impact it has on his daily life. We enjoyed looking and talking about the artefacts he brought.

After all of our practise, sports day was a huge success! We thouroughly enjoyed cheering on our classmates as they took part in the various activities representing their respective houses. A huge thank you to everyone who was able to come along and support us.
