Vacancies

We have exciting opportunities coming up at Ralph Butterfield Primary School. Please see below for full details:-

North Yorkshire County Council—Cleaning Assistant. Working for NYCC as a Cleaning Assistant, you will be responsible for the cleaning duties on site including dusting, vacuuming and the cleaning of sanitary fittings. Full training will be provided and the hours are between 3:30pm and 6:30pm daily, with some flexibility on start and finish time and totalling to 12.5 per week over 5 days. North Yorkshire County Council—Cleaning Supervisor. Working for NYCC as a Cleaning Supervisor, you will be required to assist in the supervision of the cleaning assistants working at the school through monitoring their areas, dealing with any issues promptly and feeding back to management as required, as well as accommodating requests from school staff. In addition to this you will be responsible for your own cleaning duties in your designated area which include vacuuming, sanitary cleaning and dusting. EYFS

This week, our phonics journey took us to i,n, m and d. The children have also enjoyed playing phonics games such as touch your... in which the teacher 'sound talks' a body part for example touch your 'l-e-g'.





The children had the opportunity to get creative with natural item this week when we made nature portraits. We were really impressed with the children's use of the natural objects – there were hay hair styles, shell eyes and conker noses!

Each class has taken their turn in surprising the other classes when we went on a tour of our school. It was a lovely opportunity for some of the children to visit their siblings and meet other staff members. The children were surprised to find the new world beyond the hall doors!

In Maths this week, we have focussed on comparisons of amounts, sizes, lengths and heights through lots of practical activities. The children have listened attentively during carpet time and it was a pleasure to then see them apply their new learning and vocabulary when working independently in child initiated play sessions. A large teddy and small teddy made comparisons of sizes and amounts at their teddy bears picnic. The language evolved from 'Daddy Bear' to big or large bear. The children's mathematical vocabulary has blossom throughout the week!


Key Stage 1 (Years 1 & 2)

We did a great job of remembering our capital letters, punctuation and adjectives.







In maths, we have continued to focus on place value to ensure we have a clear understanding about the value of digits by developing our partitioning knowledge.

18th September 1935 - Outbreak of Chicken Pox affecting attendance Only 128 in school out of 144
