#### **Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS)**

Welcome back to the start of a new half-term!

We are delighted to share with you that our new theme is 'Traditional Tales'. The children's learning will be centred around many different traditional and favourite stories. This week, the children have enjoyed exploring the story of The Gingerbread Man and variations of this story, The Runaway Chapatti and The Runaway Pizza. The children have enjoyed reading and comparing the stories. They have also acted out the story with characters.

Additional learning opportunities, based on these books, have included baking our own gingerbread men, creating a gingerbread man face by threading and drawing, sorting the different types of animals in these stories including farm animals and pets and creating story maps.



On Tuesday, the children learnt about the Christian day of Shrove Tuesday. They found out about the significance of the day and how people observe it. We also made and tasted our own pancakes. Chef Dickinson did a marvellous job of making these with all of our children and we had lots of happy customers!

This half-term, our **phonics** lessons will consolidate the digraphs and trigraphs already taught. The children will have opportunity to practise reading words which contain these phonemes (sounds) and also revise the tricky words taught so far. Please see the homework activities, to catch up with weekly learning. It is fantastic to see the progress which all children are making with their phonics knowledge and to see how they put this into action while reading and writing.



In **Maths**, this week, we have further developed number bonds to 9 and 10. These are pairs of numbers which add together to make a given total. For example, 6+3 =9 and 2+8 =10. This has been practised through a range of games and activities.



We would love to see everyone enjoying listening to, acting out and reading their favourite traditional tale. If your child enjoys doing this at home, please upload a photo to Tapestry so we can share their love of stories.

#### **Key Stage 1 (Years 1 & 2)**

It was great to welcome back all of the children this week and to hear some of the wonderful and exciting things that they did during their well-earned week off. Key Stage 1 hit the ground running with another busy week packed full of learning!

In English, this week, the children were writing recounts about their half-term holiday activities and about the visit from Florence Nightingale. They had to think carefully and write in as much detail as possible to bring their memories to life. They also learned how to write an introduction that would pique the reader's interest and include key information. They did a wonderful job and we could see their enthusiasm shining through their writing.





This week, we have been thinking carefully about the responsibilities we have to protect ourselves and those around us. We have revisited our Big Question



of the term, thinking about the word 'respect', what it means and why it is so important. We also learned about the fun ways that we can enjoy the internet in a digital age but also about some of

the dangers that this presents. We learned some valuable tips for staying safe online and how important it is to tell people we trust when something upsets us.

In maths, we have been practising mental calculation techniques to become mental maths masters! We have looked at how we can think differently about numbers so that we can work with them more effectively. We also continued our work with money. The children have enjoyed stepping into the roles of customer and shopkeeper by totalling amounts, selecting coins to pay and calculating change.

#### Lower Key Stage 2 (Years 3 & 4)

What a great start to the half term! Year 3 and 4 have returned refreshed, excited and eager to discover what our new topics are.



We are all really excited to have started our new history topic 'Revolutionary Romans' and are looking forward to finding out about why the Romans invaded Britain and how the Roman army were so successful. As we progress through the topic, we will delve into different aspects of their everyday lives; discover key information about how roads were built and develop an understanding of chariots, gladiators and theatres. This week, to introduce the topic, we have discovered who the Romans were and ordered key events in the rise of the Roman Empire, to ensure that we have a good understanding of the period of time in history that we will be continuing to explore.

In computing, we are focusing on writing for different audiences and the impact that font style, size and colour has on how a text is presented and how these are used within different genres to make texts appealing to the reader. This week, we looked at newspaper reports. The children spent time altering the look of a pre-written newspaper article ensuring that the newspaper title and headlines stood out and the text was in columns with relevant pictures and captions to compliment the article.





Our science topic this half term is electricity. We started our topic off by sharing everything we knew already about electricity including what it is for and how it is used. We then discussed how electricity is generated (renewable and non-renewable sources).

We are all looking forward to exploring electrical circuits and creating our own, after learning about appliances, battery and mains powered electrical items as well as mostly importantly, how to use electricity and electrical equipment safely.

#### Upper Key Stage 2 (Years 5 & 6)



In English lessons, we have been learning about the various types of persuasion. We have looked at a variety of examples and have identified the key features of persuasive texts: catch phrases, slogans, emotive vocabulary and rhetorical questions. We then created a word bank and utilised this to write our own persuasive sentences.

In geography, we learnt that the risk of flooding can sometimes be increased through deforestation, urbanisation and even drought. We then looked at the impact that flooding has on people's lives and the environment. We discussed the impact flooding has had on our own lives and that of the local community.





This week, we were visited by the author. Daniel Blyth. He talked to us about how we became AUTHOR an author and shared some of his work with us. He then worked with individual classes giving advice on how to write spooky stories.




#### A message for all children 'You Are a Reader'!


